VICAR'S LETTER

By the time you read this, the Season of Lent will have started or be about to start – Ash Wednesday being the 9th March this year.

The Lentern period of 40 days is a good time to take some out to be quiet and pray – and also check to see that one's prayer life is in good repair. There is much to learn about prayer – a lifetime of learning. A wonderful journey of discovery. Bishop J.C. Ryle,over a century ago, when asked what sort of parish he would like, replied "Give me a parish that prays." Madeleine Delbrel said "Prayer is the Energy of Action." That's the right way round: pray before you leap!

How were you taught to say your prayers? If you always say your prayers in the same place, you can keep a list of people you want to pray for; and add someone's name to it whenever they ask you to pray for them. But there are other times when we want pray, and you can't carry your list around with you everywhere (although modern electronic hand-held devices have made it easier to have your prayer list with you).

There is very old way of remembering whom to pray for. Making a steeple with your hands. Perhaps you were taught this years ago in Sunday School, and have forgotten it; but I don't think it ever goes out of date, and it may give your prayers a lift if you go back to using it for a while. Every pianist has to begin by practising their five-finger exercises, and this is the five-finger exercise of prayer.

First, you begin by putting your hands together in the traditional position for prayer, with your fingers upright forming a steeple. It's like Albrecht Durer's famous engraving of "The Praying Hands". Then, you think of each pair of fingers, on the right and left hands, one after another.

Nearest to you when your hands are up like that will be your left and right thumbs. So begin by praying for those who are near to you: your family and close friends. Ask God to care for your parents if they're alive, or give thanks for all they did for you if they've already died. Pray for your children, if you have any, and ask that their hopes and dreams may be fulfilled. Pray for your wife, husband or partner, if you have one; pray for their health, and for the strengthening of your relationship. Pray also for any particularly close friends, who are almost family to you; as with everybody else, pray for their health, wealth and happiness, and ask God to take them to live with him in heaven when they die.

The next two fingers, after the thumbs, are called the index fingers, because we use them to indicate something by pointing at it; they're the pointing fin-

gers. So they remind you to pray for people who point the way, who show people what to think and how to live. That includes any schoolteachers you know, who point the way for the children in their care; preachers who point out the Christian way of life; and those who influence public opinion by writing in the newspapers and speaking on the television.

The middle fingers are the longest; when you hold your hands up to pray, these fingers are higher than any others. They remind us to pray for those who are in positions of high authority: our royal family; world leaders and the United Nations; our government and national leaders; leaders in the business world; and any others in high positions of authority. They need all the prayers we can offer them, to help with the difficult decisions they have to make.

The next fingers are said to be the weakest fingers, so we pray next for the weak, and those who care for them: sick people in hospital; the handicapped and those hungry and starving in other countries.

Finally, the little fingers are the smallest, and remind you to pray for the least important person - yourself. That's not to say you shouldn't have self-respect; but your prayers shouldn't be full of me, me, me. Ask for the things you need to make you useful to God and to other people - but let your own requests come last, after you've finished praying for others.

Of course, there are other things to pray about, which are not included in the five-finger exercise, e.g. adoration, confession, thanksgiving, etc. But, your fingers are always there to remind you: closest - pointers - those who are high - weakest - and yourself the least. The "Steeple" - a simple, but effective, way to make up a prayer list: anywhere, anytime.

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 6TH JANUARY 2011 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

PRESENT: Councillors Miss R Dobbs (Chair Person), I Russell, P Rignall, N James, M Dickie, S Curtis, Mrs L Etheridge, Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer)

APOLOGIES: Councillor B Bartram, County Councillor Mrs S Rawlins

94 POLICE MATTERS

The Clerk was asked to write to the Chief Constable of Lincolnshire expressing the concern of the Parish Council that only PCSO cover was available from the Nettleham office after 5.30pm weekdays and weekends. Due to the limited powers of the PCOS's it was felt that their well being is at greater risk. The area car is also having to cover a larger geographical area which results in a slower response time to incidents with our area.

95 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

It was noted that dog fouling had increased in the village since the onset of bad weather.

96 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis reported that for West Lindsey the office of all District, Town and Parish Councillors will end in May 2011 and elections will be held on Thursday 5^{th} May 2011 throughout the entire administrative area.

97 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 4TH NOVEMBER 2010 AND 2ND DECEMBER 2010

These were signed as a correct record.

98 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- a) Skateboard Park It was agreed that this was not going to be possible at present as the cost would be in the region of £80,000.
- **b) Village Sign** Members reconsidered the designs and agreed that powder coating was required on the metal in order to avoid discolouration, plus a further two quotations would be required in accordance with the Council's financial regulations.

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The Clerk was currently investigating the possibility of grants for the cost but to date had not been successful. A further report would be given at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

- **c)** Trees around bus shelter, Wragby Road The Clerk would communicate with the Highways Department regarding these overhanging trees.
- **d)** Christmas tree and Millennium stone lighting The Christmas tree and illuminated millennium stone had looked good. Thanks were due to Pat Wright, Oliver Wright, Roger Adams and Dave Garnham for fixing the lights on the tree in difficult conditions.

The date for this year's event was arranged - 27th November 2011.

99 HIGHWAY MATTERS - CONDITION AND GRITTING OF ESTATE ROADS DURING SEVERE WEATHER

Discussion ensued about the untreated condition of the estate roads during the recent long period of bad weather.

It was reported that some residents who had contacted the Highways Department had been informed that the responsibility for the road gritting rested with the Parish Council. The Clerk was instructed to contact the Highways Department informing them of this wrong information and requesting that consideration be given in the future to gritting the main bus route through the estate.

Request for additional grit bin - It was also agreed that a grit bin be requested and sited by the shop.

100 SUGGESTION OF COMPILATION OF LIST OF EMAIL ADDRESSES OF RESIDENTS WANTING ALERTS IN EXCEPTIONAL/EMERGENCY CIRCUMSTANCES

The Clerk offered to set up a list of residents email addresses who wished to be alerted in emergency/urgent situations. A note would be put in Sudbrooke News to this effect.

101 GROUNDS MAINTENANCE QUOTATION - 2011 SEASON

The grounds maintenance quotation from Veolia was considered and accepted.

102 REVIEW OF RISK ASSESSMENT

Items 1-4 of the Risk Assessment were reviewed and amendments made as required. Items 5-8 will be reviewed at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

103 PLANNING

- a) Central Lincolnshire Core Strategy Issues and Consultation the questionnaire had circulated amongst members and comments made as follows:-
- The provision of new roads is essential before any large scale development plus a complete solution to the issue of level crossing barriers in the city.
- There is no demand for alternative transport private car usage will continue to grow therefore an appropriate road network needs to be put in place. Any major development will increase the risk of flooding both in the immediate vicinity and 'downstream'.
- Before any major development goes ahead all endeavours should be made to bring the hundreds of empty existing buildings back into use.
- It is felt that many of the issues for the Lincoln area are dependent on whether or not the Eastern by-pass goes ahead. Some suggestions would be unworkable if the river crossings are not improved.

b) Planning Applications:-

The following planning applications had been circulated to members and the comments made forwarded to the WLDC Planning Department:-

3 Manor Drive – 126584 – Proposed lounge extension and first floor bedroom – No objections providing that all comments from neighbouring properties are taken into account when determining the application.

8 Park Close – 126698 – Sun room, first floor extension and internal alterations to replace existing permission 120901 dated 20^{th} November 2007 – No objections

NB Councillor Miss Rose Dobbs had declared a personal interest in this application being the owner of the property. No discussion took place at the meeting.

c) Planning Permissions:-

3 Manor Drive – 126584 – Proposed lounge extension and first floor bedroom

Manor House, Scothern Lane – 125979 – Demolition of single storey extension and replace with two storey extension with glass link.

d) Attendance at future Parish Council meeting by Principal Planning

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Officer, WLDC – Cllr Stuart Curtis agreed to arrange for the attendance of Mr Mark Sturgess to attend a future Parish Council meeting to make an address on planning issues.

Notification that the bus passes would in future be administered by Lincolnshire County Council.

Notice of LALC Training events – dates issued to members.

The Playground Inspector had pointed out that there had been glass on the Tennis Courts which he had removed and that there was a continual amount of litter around the village hall.

Report of Parish Council Meeting held on 3 February 2011

Police Matters - PC Donnah Thompson had forwarded the following report on incidents:-

Incident 02/01/11 - 5/6 youths throwing stones at window on Holme Drive. Area search but no trace of youths.

Incident 03/01/11 – Youths throwing stones at vehicle parked on driveway, Manor Drive. Damage caused to vehicle window. Area search but no trace of youths.

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In relation to the above 2 incidents, we had a few similar incidents in December 2010 with youths throwing snowballs, believed to be the same group although no actual witnesses to say who is responsible. Evening Patrols conducted by Officers on several dates, but no youths seen out in the village.

Incident 15/01/11 – Youths found in car park of Village Hall in vehicles. Search of vehicles revealed one youth in possession of cannabis – Informal warning given to offender.

Several requests had been made to a member of the Scothern Football Club, users of the Scothern Lane sports field in the previous season, for the return of the key to the changing cabin. The requests had been ignored and the Clerk was asked to put the request in writing.

Proposed Village Sign – The proposed village sign was discussed in depth. Members agreed that a sign for the village would be welcoming to the village but the cost of £3000 was considered too expensive in the current financial climate. The Clerk had researched the possibility of grants but had been informed that a sign is not considered priority for funding. It was suggested that fund raising could possibly be undertaken by a committee/group of people for a sign. Other suggestions were made of a sign solely in wood produced by the Wood Carving/Community Group or a sign could be painted by a local artist and the frame made from timber carved by the Group.

West Drive/Beech Tree Corner – It was noted that stones had been placed on the grass on Beech Tree corner which would prevent the grass cutting contractors cutting this area in the coming months.

Update on gritting of estate roads during severe weather - No reply had been received from the Highways Department. County Councillor Mrs S Rawlins would pursue the matter on behalf of the Parish Council

Multi-Purpose Sports Area

I read with interest the Editor's comments in the last edition of Sudbrooke News concerning the use of the Multi-Purpose Sports area.

The facilities were provided by the Parish Council to encourage additional sporting activities alongside the playing field. The cost was £11000 met by Parish Council funds and grants from West Lindsey District Council and the Sports Council. An undertaking was given to the Sports Council that the complex would be available for all ages and sporting activities including tennis, 5-a-side football, netball and hockey. David Thorpe formed a very successful tennis club for all age groups. Jim Oliver and myself held football coaching classes every Saturday morning and also arranged 5-a-side competitions. The facilities were also used by Pre-School and Brownies. Although I tried to reform the Tennis Club a couple of years ago the facilities have unfortunately become a "white elephant "and now are only used for the odd tennis game during the summer months. The Parish Council would welcome more interest to be shown particularly from sporting groups who would be prepared to accept responsibility for its running and upkeep.

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

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The Dogs (fouling of land) Act 1996

makes it an offence 'for any person responsible for a dog not to remove the faeces should it foul on <u>any land to which the public have access'</u>. It is not a defence to claim ignorance of the dogs' actions or of the law, or to not have a suitable device to remove the faeces. Fixed penalty notices can be issued to offenders or a fine of up to £1000 may be applied.

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Welcome back to the new gardening year and to Gardening News.

Many people have found that the exceptionally hard winter has damaged and killed off some plants, and we are no exception.

In the front garden a thriving Leycesteria looks almost dead, but if cut down to a few healthier shoots it may recover. Also a Hebe appears to have been killed off, with no hope of recovery. The whole front garden requires a general tidying up, and some pruning and cutting back.

The back garden will need a lot of attention, there are several plants which have not survived, but already we have been able to start on the shrubbery by giving the laurel a first trimming and taking down a Yew tree which had outgrown its allotted space. Some rampant shrubs have also been taken out. A small twining honeysuckle had crept along the whole shrubbery area and because it was smothering other plants has been taken out. The Camellia is looking very healthy and full of bud, so we are looking forward to a good show.

It is probably a good time to mention that we do have some help in the garden as we found that we would need help with the heavier work. The rebuilding of the pergola last year, and the replacement guttering were all completed with this extra help, as were many other tasks. At the moment we have the services of our helpful gardener for two hours fortnightly and do the gardening ourselves in the meantime. The overgrown shrubbery is the first to benefit from his help this year, but still more work is needed to complete the task.

A man is expected to play a fuller role in the running of the family home as well. Gone are the days when a man wouldn't be seen dead washing up or ironing or cooking. It's a much more equal workload now and most folks would say that it is a change for the better. The male dominance is much less now and a woman's role is far more equal.

There is far less difference between boys and girls now as well. So many children's clothes are multi sex and except on formal occasions they will dress in similar outfits. With the coming of ipods and Computers so many games and toys are provided for both sexes there really is no difference between them. Equal opportunity's in education and employment as well as sport and hobbies have made a much more level playing field. Boy Scouts and Girl Guides as well as Cadet Units of the Armed Forces have now mostly been amalgamated.



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



A SUCCESS STORY FOR SUDBROOKE NEWS



A few months ago, a coach party of about 50 elderly members of The Royal British Legion in West Sussex came on a trip organised by a former Lincoln "Yellow Belly "to spend the day at Waddington Air Show. Many of them were former RAF personnel, some of whom had served in WW11.

At the end of the show, to round off their visit, they visited the churchyard at Scampton Village to view the war graves there. This visit was inspired by articles which had been published in Sudbrooke News a while back. The organiser of the trip is someone who receives an electronic copy of this magazine each month.

The visitors really enjoyed their visit to this wonderful peaceful and tranquil setting in this small village and it made a nice contrast to the noise and bustle of the Air Show and was a fitting end to a memorable day. Many of the party were moved to tears as they viewed the war graves so lovingly kept and tended. However, they were bitterly disappointed and surprised at the condition of the memorial plot of the Victoria Cross holder, Flight Sgt John Hannah, VC, which looked untidy, unkempt and neglected. Most of the roses in the plot were dead or dying being very old and several suffering from disease and mildew. The memorial notice was green with lichen. One of the party cleaned it with a water soaked cloth to make it legible. All of them thought it was a great pity and pressed their local ex pat member to write in and try to get something done to make the memorial plot more worthy of the brave man whom it commemorated.

This he did and as soon as I received the letter I showed it to the Old Codger who immediately said he wanted to do something about it.

The memorial plot had fallen into neglect after a retired RAF officer, who had maintained it in pristine condition over many years, had passed on. Despite

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appeals and advertising locally in Scampton, no one else had been forthcoming and regrettably the plot had reached the neglected state the visiting party had found it in.

With the aid of two ladies from Scampton, the former churchwarden Mrs Susan Deacon and the Clerk to the Parish Council, Mrs Barbara Coleman, the Old Codger was supplied with details of the history of the memorial. He contacted the Commanding Officer, RAF Scampton, who was most sympathetic and helpful and promised to task one of his Officers to investigate the possibility of the permanent long term upkeep of the plot. The War Graves Commission were contacted as RAF Scampton is due to close in 4 years time and the Commanding Officer wanted to ensure that whatever steps were taken now where able to be continued for the future. This process is currently ongoing.

The immediate problem was, what could be done right now to make this memorial a fitting tribute to the man it commemorated? Our own Gardening Correspondent, GP, kindly visited the site and confirmed the "Hannah Rose" was diseased and beyond salvage. The matter was mentioned to Mrs Amanda Hackney of Scothern Nurseries, explaining the immediate need to replace the rose plants in the memorial and the fact there was no money available to provide this replacement. Mrs Hackney at once volunteered to sponsor the memorial and supply replacement rose bushes and fertiliser free of charge. The cost of this sponsorship was a considerable sum and Mrs Hackney's company, Scothern Nurseries' generous offer, meant that refurbishment of the plot could begin without delay.

The next problem to overcome was to provide someone to undertake the refurbishment and maintenance. This was soon resolved as local landscape gardening expert Peter Brown of "Landscape Gardening" immediately agreed and stated he would be delighted and honoured to take over the task, restore the memorial and keep it in good condition free of charge.

Thanks to the Old Codger, GP and the two wonderful generous local sponsors, the memorial has now been restored and will soon be bearing beautiful fragrant roses in all it's full glory. A truly fitting tribute to one of our bravest and finest. Thank you.

How much time does it take up? Quite often Councillors say that their duties occupy them for one - three hours a week. In the main, being a parish Councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to the village and community and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

Am I qualified? Most people are. However there are a few rules. You have to be:

- A British Citizen or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union
- 18 years or older
- His/her principal or only place of work in the previous 12 months has been in the Parish
- Registered as a Local Government Elector on the current Electoral Register
- Have resided either in the parish or within 3 miles thereof during the previous 12 months

During the whole of the previous 12 months occupied as tenant or owner of any land or other premises in the Parish

You cannot stand for election if you are:-

- the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order
- have, within five years prior to being elected, been convicted in the UK of an offence and have had a prison sentence (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine.

Welcome to this edition of the Police News. We have been enjoying a relatively quiet few weeks in our area with no major crimes to mention.

Our Community Panel was held on the 9th February to discuss and decide what the Neighbourhood Policing Team priorities will be for the next 3 months. After much discussion with the representatives it was decided to keep the priorities, which we have had for the last 3 months, which are: -

- ASB in Bardney (Anti-social behaviour).
- Parking outside the schools in our area (9 in total)
- Off road motorcycling at the Old Coach Road, A15, Riseholme.
- Taking from motor vehicles in Fiskerton, Cherry Willingham and Bardney.

I have been asked by several residents to mention horses being ridden on the road and to ask that motorists please slow down when passing a horse on the road. This is a polite and courteous thing to do and also safer for everyone concerned.

On speaking to several motorists as well it has been mentioned that a little acknowledgement from the horse rider thanking the motorist for slowing down goes a long way. Politeness is a two-way thing and if everyone tried to be a little politer the world would be a much better place. Please 'Think Horses'.

Can you also please make sure that if you are riding your bike that you are wearing something that you can be seen in such as a reflective jacket and that you have good lights at the front and back of your cycle. I mention this every winter, but I still see people on their bikes with dark clothing and no lights. Even under streetlights it is difficult to see a person on a bicycle unless they have lights and are wearing something bright or reflective. If your child is paperboy/girl please make sure that they have lights and that they are in good working condition. I have stopped young people with their bikes and they have lights fitted to the bike, but when asked to switch them on the batteries or bulbs have gone and are unusable.

We have had a couple of diesel and oil thefts in the area. With the price of

these fuels being so high at the moment I can imagine that this may begin to happen more often. Please check the security around your oil/fuel tanks and the perimeter of your property to prevent these thefts from happening. Sometimes the thieves are damaging the tank to remove the fuel and not only do you have to replace the fuel but also the tank, which can be costly business.

There have been instances where people have tried to phone the Police station several times over a period of days in an attempt to report a crime to a local officer, which of course potentially delays the likelihood of detecting offenders as well as providing callers with frustration. Please note therefore: - the Police station is often unstaffed due to officers being deployed to incidents. When reporting a crime, please report them directly to Lincolnshire Police on 0300 111 **0300** where your crime will be recorded by a dedicated call-taker.

For example, users will, for the first time, be able to use memory sticks, download digital images, and much more. Printing and photocopying (black and white and colour up to A3) will be via one multifunctional machine, the quality is much, much better than current printers/photocopier allow.

Of course, the technology can't do everything so the library staff will still be available to help you with your enquiries and to manage all the other aspects of the library. In fact, you should find that you get more quality time with us than at the moment because we will be freed up from issuing and stamping books, giving us more time to dedicate to helping you with your enquiries and book choices.

Technology is all very well and good you might say, but what about new library book stock? Well, the good news is that in addition to the technological improvements, the library will also benefit from a significant amount of new library stock and a new top of shelf signage scheme.

The new self service machines do require you to always have your library card with you, so please remember to bring it every visit otherwise you will not be able to borrow any stock! Have you lost your card? Just call in to get a replacement as soon as possible. In anticipation of these exciting improvements, we have been running a replacement card amnesty for some months. This amnesty will end on 31st March after which it will cost you £2.00 for a new card, so do call in to get your replacement card before that date.

READING PASSPORTS/ROOTED IN READING SCHEME

Lincolnshire Libraries have been working with the Lincolnshire School Improvement Service as part of the Rooted in Reading scheme for a number of years now, through the Reading Passports scheme. This scheme is designed to allow individuals to get the most out of their reading experience by recording what they have read, and their thoughts and comments on these books, in a passport sized booklet. Lincolnshire Libraries are focusing on the following 4 passports:

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- Sharing Stories and Rhymes Passport this is aimed at the parents of pre-school children as a way of encouraging reading together and recording the books and rhymes shared with their child and how they responded to them.
- Reading Together Passport This is aimed at children aged 5 to 11 years and their parents and allows them to record the books they have read and their feelings or thoughts about them.
- Readers Passport This is aimed at adults and young people aged 12 years and over and allows views about books read to be recorded. They can also be used by Reading Group members to gather ideas as they read so that they can be shared at meetings. Community Passport This is aimed at the wider community. The Passport should be used in your Library and be available for customers to record what they have read and thought about the title. This is then available for others to read and may prompt them to borrow the title or add their own title and review.

Please feel free to help yourself and/or your child to a passport and begin on the Rooted in Reading journey. Alternatively, why not make an entry in the Community Passport, an A4 sized booklet, which remains in the library so that library users can share their reading experiences.
