100) Parishoners items

Some residents had drawn to members' attention that they were not able to have clear vision in the vicinity of the shop on Holme Drive due to vehicles parking on or very close to the junction. It was noted also that vans were often parked in that area which also obstructed vision. The matter had been reported to the local Police Team.

It was understood that similar problems were being experienced near to the church with vehicles parking on the footpath, blocking it entirely in some cases, causing pedestrians to have to walk on the road.

The Clerk was asked to contact the Vicar to ask that she bring the matter to the attention of the congregation and that, although it was a few minutes walk from the church, parking was available in the village hall car park if required.

- **a** a) **Vandalism to Millennium stone lights** These had now been repaired and an insurance claim had been made for the cost.
- **b) Christmas Tree Event** This had run successfully, thanks were extended to the helpers and those erecting and maintaining the tree throughout the time it was lit.

- d) **Damage to Sudbrooke sign/grit bin, Nettleham Lane** The Sudbrooke sign and grit box on Nettleham Lane had been hit by a vehicle, noticeably red by the amount of paint left on the grit box. The Police had been notified.
- e) Status of Church Lane in respect of heavy goods access The Chair had contacted Nettleham Parish Council proposing that both Parish Councils could possibly approach the Highways Department to see if a restriction could be placed on Church Lane (and Nettleham village) to prevent general access of HGVs in the event of a road closure on the A158. Brief report of meeting held on February 6, 2014

Six Parish Councillors were present along with six residents, the Clerk, Treasurer and PCSO Jackie Parker.

A proposed planning application for a property on Church Lane was outlined to the meeting and this will be discussed in more detail as an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council on March 6.

- **Dog Fouling:** Unfortunately it was reported as there being a substantial increase in residents not picking up after their dogs see other articles in the magazine.
- **Police Matters:** A Report was given as follows:

17/1/14 - A car was driven into a wall of a house on Northfield Avenue; there were no injuries, but damage to the property and vehicle.

1/2/14 - A male was stopped for selling door to door without a licence.

2/2/14 - A laptop bag was taken from a porch on St Edward's Drive.

- **Mobile Library Provision:** Notification received that the mobile library will continue to visit Sudbrooke for one hour a month with effect from May 2014.
- **Litter Pick:** To be organised for Saturday 15 March, 2014.
- **Sports Day:** To be organised for June 29, 2014.
- Village Sign: A request had been received from a resident for the calling of a Public Meeting to discuss the production of a village sign. Members felt that the Village Sign had been discussed in depth in the past and information given in **Sudbrooke News** where residents had the opportunity to put suggestions forward. Unfortunately any proposals had had to be shelved due to the high cost involved in the purchase of materials and grant funding not being available.

Publicity has been given to the donation of a piece of oak from a tree in Sudbrooke Scout Camp to the Carving Group so that they can work on it and hopefully produce a sign for the village at relatively low cost. This will take several months of work by the Group.

19/2/2014 - The piece of oak has now been transported to the Village Hall, at no cost to the village, by Andy Carr Scout Leader and Carl Wilkinson, to which sincere thanks must be extended for their time and use of their equipment. It is a large piece sited at the front of the hall so that residents can view its progress over the next few months.

■ Annual Parish Meeting - April 3, 7pm (Village Hall): An Officer from the Building Control Department of West Lindsey District Council will give a short, informative address which it is hoped some residents will find useful. Residents are very welcome and indeed encouraged to attend to also hear a resume of what has been going on in the village during the last 12 months.

Many problems had to be overcome including finding a storage location whilst it was being carved and moving the branch to the location.

After meeting with the Parish Council, it was agreed that the carving group could work on the trunk in the corner of the Village Hall car park. Andy from the Scout camp said that he could help with delivery.

At 5pm on February 12, I was very pleased to witness a very large low loader vehicle and a digger arriving at the Village Hall. With daylight fading, Andy Carr and Carl

Wilkinson skilfully manipulated the oak branch and some large oak props and transferred the oak branch onto the verge.

Carl was very skilled manoeuvring the oak branch onto the props with his digger as it was far too large and heavy to move manually.

Sudbrooke Carving Group would like to thank Andy from the Scout Camp and Carl of Wilkinson Plant Hire, Scothern, for their community spirit in both thinking of the carving group in Sudbrooke in the first place and then their considerable efforts in supplying transport and making the difficult delivery. ■ As a regular 'helper' at Kingdom Kids, I was asked to provide a glimpse into the exciting, caring and fascinating club for Key Stage Two children here at Ellison Boulters.

I thought it only fair to let the children have an input, so I asked them how they would describe this after-school club that always has a long waiting list!

"Fun, friendship and worship" were the words that were repeated time and time again, oh and the fact that they get, "squash and a biscuit!"

Treats aside, Kingdom Kids at Ellison Boulters offers weekly Christian fellowship, arts, crafts and so much more. It offers an additional opportunity for Christian discussion, investigation and reflection in an environment where the children are supported by members of staff and the community who are willing and eager to help the children's spiritual journeys.

Children from across the key stage are lead by Mrs. Peachman, the R.E leader in the school, and a team of devoted and keen Year 6 junior leaders who provide support and guidance.

BUILDINGS OF CHARACTER =

I think I have shared with you before that prior to coming into the Ministry I used to be a teacher at Lincoln Christ's Hospital School.

One of the things that has always struck me about that school is its history. While I was there, it celebrated 900 years of education on that site in Lincoln. Of course, the school hasn't always looked as it does now, because it has changed with the times and needs of the students that attend, but in so many ways it seemed to me that it managed to keep its rootedness, while still changing to cater for many different generations of students with different needs.

I remember not long after my time there discovering an old table, and I mean really old (!), and into it was etched medieval graffiti, containing the names of previous students – and that always reminded me that history is made by people.

Churches are also made by people. When followers of Jesus met together after the resurrection of Jesus, they did not have huge buildings, largely they met together in homes, or gathered in the street (the weather was no doubt better than ours!).

The word 'church' comes from the word 'ekklesia' which means a gathering of people - so 'church' is about the gathering of people around the worship of God, it is the building of community with God at the root and at its heart.

We are blessed with some beautiful buildings in our now two groups, and it thrills me when we are able to look at them as places where we can enable community to be built. Church buildings are not merely monuments that celebrate the past, they have always changed in character and if you go into many of our buildings, you will see the work of generation upon generation.

Some of you might have popped into Reepham Church recently and will have seen massive change, and at Fiskerton, how wonderful it is to see the development of a new toilet and kitchen area.

You might ask, why do this? Well our churches should be at the heart of serving our community and its important that our buildings reflect that. I want to maintain our roots, but adapt to the needs of our communities, as far as we can.

DOG FOULING

from a legal perspective...

Following recent complaints concerning dog fouling in the village, I have been asked to remind residents that it is an offence for an owner to allow a dog to foul without cleaning up the mess in any area in the open air.

This in effect means that it is an offence not to clean up after a dog has fouled on most roads, footpaths, grass verges, playing fields, parks and other public areas.

It is not an offence to allow a dog to foul, the offence is not

cleaning up afterwards. Dog owners would therefore be adprepared when out with their dog as it is not a defence to claim that they did not have the facilities to clean up.

Any person guilty of an offence under the Act can face a fine of up to £1000 although West Lindsey District Council have decided to operate a fixed penalty scheme where offenders are given the option of paying a fixed fine of £50 and avoiding a Court Hearing.

Help will be available until the 3 November, with applications accepted until Friday, August 1, to support those residents who need support moving into accommodation that meets their current or future needs.



A Sudbrooke resident travels down south for a first visit to the county of Dorset and encounters

BEAUTIFUL DORSET

"You can see all five counties from here on a good day," explained John, owner of Chisel Barn Whites Ground as we stood on top of Hambledon Hill, with an impressive 360 degree vista of the surrounding countryside.

I had clung tightly to the back of his quad bike as he powered up the chalk outcrop on a lovely summer's morning to show me the sights with Heebie, his little dog, galloping alongside us, who seemed not in the slightest worried about getting crushed by the bike's wheels.

Hambledon Hill is a stunning location in the Blackmore Vale region of North Dorset, and on a clear day you really can see the lands of Somerset, Wiltshire, Hampshire and Devon striding out into the distance all around you.


The outcrop is also the site of a very impressive Iron Age hill fort, one of the best in Britain.

In the shadow of Hambledon Hill stands Chisel Barn Whites Ground, our home for a first-ever family trip to Dorset, part of Blue Chip Holidays' impressive portfolio of four and five-star self-catering properties.

Based on a working farm, this petfriendly house is actually a former dairy and converted stable block, not that you would ever guess when walking through the front door. All that gives away its heritage are the two charcoal pictures of a pony camp that sit either side of the pretty raised log burning stove.

a beautiful landscape, great beaches, amazing history and attractions aplenty in the summer sun

love walking, it is in the perfect spot. Just 20 miles or so north of the house is Longleat, home of the safari park and stately home, which makes for a terrific day out.

Deciding to do the 'on foot' zoo first, we beat the queues to go on the jungle cruise, where you take a boat ride around the park lake, and head for gorilla island, where if you are lucky you will catch a glimpse of Nico, the 52-year-old silverback on his centrally-heated enclave, where he has a classical-style home complete with Sky TV.

The Longleat railway took us around parts of the park inaccessible by foot, and after Thomas bravely stroked a yellow python, it was off to the adventure castle, which had the sort of playground that makes you yearn to be a child again.

We left the safari park until last and, of course, the monkey drive-thru proved to be the most exciting part for Thomas and Lucy as, much to their amusement, a couple of Rhesus monkeys clambered aboard our car and went for a little drive while picking dead flies from the roof.

The seaside town of Weymouth is not too far away and a trip to the Sea Life centre was a must. Not only were the children enchanted by sharks, otters and seals, but the entrance fee also included a trip up the £3.5million Weymouth Tower, which can be reached by the Sea Life train or a long walk if you happen to miss it. like we did.

Once at the 174ft tower, you enter the disc-shaped gondola, which spirals upwards at a leisurely rate giving you





the chance to take in all the magical views.

The Dorset coast is also home to Studland Bay - there are four beaches to choose from and we chose the narrow strip of sand at South Beach, which proved ideal as Lucy and mummy could play on the sands, while Thomas and I braved the shallow waters as we fooled around in the Solent on what was another hot, balmy summer's day, making Dorset a truly special part of the country as a holiday destination.

GARDEN THEFTS -

Trime in our area often takes on a pattern; at the moment we seem to be having a spate of garden ornament thefts from gardens around the county.

This can range from small pots and plants right up to large garden statues and urns - a lot of these larger items will have taken more that just one person to remove and would often require a vehicle of some kind.

These items are mostly sold, either at car boot sales or internet auction sites never to be seen again, and we are left to buy replacements.

We need to be as vigilant as possible, just keeping an eye on a neighbour's property can be enough, or keeping an eye out for people trying to sell cheap ornaments in your village, if this occurs or you have any information regarding stolen garden ornaments or any other crime please ring 101 and you will be able to speak to someone from Lincolnshire Police.

UNSOLICITED PHONE CALLS AND MAIL -

Householders may receive unsolicited telephone calls from a variety of sources.

Invariably the callers state they are from an 'official' organisation such as the water/ energy company; local authority; or a company selling goods and/or services.

In most cases the caller will be seeking information such as personal details including bank details; usage rates or other personal information.

Most of these types of calls can be reduced by the following advice:

Registering with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS)

The TPS is a free service that gives you the opportunity to select who contacts you by telephone. Once registration is complete telemarketers are legally bound not to call you.

Registration takes about a month to become effective and can be made online at www.tpsonline.org.uk or via the telephone on 0845 070 0707.

Register with the Mail Preference Service (MPS)

The MPS is a free service which supports the right for people to choose the mail they wish to receive.

Registering with this service will prevent the receipt of unsolicited direct mailing sent from companies who are members of the Direct Marketing Association.

It will not stop mail from overseas, un-addressed materials or those addresses to The Occupier.

Registration to this free service can be made online at *www.mpsonline.org.uk* or via the telephone on 0845 703 4599.

It is important to remember to protect your personal details.

Do not give any personal details including bank details to anyone either in the street, on the doorstep, over the telephone or on the internet as these details can be used to steal your identity.

A DAY AT THE RACES: POINT-TO-POINTING

BLANKNEY HUNT, NORTH CARLTON —

■ Tweed jackets, yellow trousers, and Range Rovers packed with hampers full of juicy and alcoholic treats were the order of the day as North Carlton hosted its second and final raceday of the 2013-14 Point-to-Point campaign.

Only opened in 2009 - at the time, the first Point-to-Point course to be launched in 40 years - and situated at the Lincolnshire Showground, just a few miles up the road from Sudbrooke, North Carlton racecourse holds two meetings a year, arranged by the Burton and Blankney Hunts, and on Sunday 23 February, it was the turn of the Blankneyorganised event, with eight races on the card.

For those not familiar with the Point-to-Point scene, it is the amateur version of jumps racing (National Hunt), with all horses who run at these meetings having had to have taken part in a Hunt before being eligible to compete Point-to-Point contests.

Prize money is considerably less than at National Hunt and Flat meetings – winnings can literally be a few quid, which would hardly cover travel to the event – while the fences are smaller and most races are run over distances of around three miles.

You get a varied assortment of horses taking part, from former Royal Ascot and Cheltenham Festival winners, who no longer have what it takes to compete at professional level, to horses bred or reared by individuals who just fancy having a horse to take for a spin around a few fences.

The season starts in the first week of December and ends at Umberleigh (in



Devon) in the middle of June, with most racing taking place at weekends, with around 200 meetings scheduled this campaign, although some have been wiped out by the wet weather which has seen many tracks waterlogged.

For a track based in a field at the Showground, which has only been in use for five years, you could be forgiven for thinking that North Carlton doesn't attract much of a crowd or decent horses, but there were a few hundred people in attendance, while the meeting was boosted by the presence of Robert Waley-Cohen and his son Sam, owner and jockey combination of 2011 Cheltenham Gold Cup winner Long Run.

They had one horse running at North Carlton, Storm Lantern, which finished second in the first division of the Open Maiden, behind the French-bred Saint Charles, which is being tipped for a big future in the sport, with some onlookers even describing it as a future Cheltenham Gold Cup contender of the future.

Also there on the day was Charlie Brooks, whose wife Rebekah - the former editor of

Charlie, a racehorse trainer in his own right and a leading light of the Heythrop Hunt, told me it was his first-ever visit to the track and he really enjoyed the experience.

Saint Charles was the standout performer on the day, but Mens Open winner Ganbei could be on course for a trip to the Cheltenham Festival after his second win at the track in two visits.

The Cheltenham Foxhunters contest is the biggest race of the season for horses in this sphere and one which everyone in Pointing wants to win (along with the Aintree Foxhunters at the Grand National meeting in April) and Ganbei could be lining up at Prestbury Park on Friday 14 March.

Other notable successes were a first-ever win as a jockey for London barrister Barnaby Shaw on 33-1 outsider Bravery Scotch, while 10-1 Byways Boy won the opening Hunts Members contest despite being out of action since winning the same race two years ago.

So there you have it, a day's racing at North Carlton. It may not be Cheltenham, Ascot or even Market Rasen, but it was still an occasion not to be missed, but sadly the next meeting there is in 11 months' time.

FLY A FLAG FOR COMMONWEALTH DAY



To celebrate Commonwealth Day, West Lindsey District Council is taking part in flying one of 500 Commonwealth flags. The Chairman of the Council, ClIr Irmgard Parrott, will be raising the flag at 10am on Monday 10 March 2014 at the front of the Guildhall in Gainsborough.

For the first time ever, local authorities and civic dignitaries, community groups and charities throughout the British Isles are

coming together in local flag raising events and ceremonies of dedication to mark Commonwealth Day. A specially written Commonwealth Affirmation wil be read out by the Chairman before raising the flag.

Sudbrooke has many interesting residents living in the village and this is the latest in a series where we get to know a bit more about the characters living amongst us.

NEXT PERSON IN THE SPOTLIGHT IS STUART CURTIS

How long have you lived in the village?

All my life, born and bred - let's say over 60 years and counting. I was born here after my parents moved to the village shortly after the War. They were both from the Lincolnshire Wolds and myself, my brother and sister were all brought up here. I can still remember the Home Guard army camp in the woods and I was at the garden party in 1953 for the Queen's coronation, which was the last time Sudbrooke Holme gardens were used.

How would villagers better you know as?

As a West Lindsey District Councillor, and Parish Councillor of 30 years standing, while I was also one of the founding members of the Sudbrooke Village Hall Committee. I was involved with all the fundraising to get the Hall built and did the job of negotiating for the site and did all the legal work for the Parish Council.

I retired last year after 50 years as a legal executive for Burton and Co. solicitors in Lincoln. I worked in the same office since leaving school at 16 until last year. I was also a local football referee for about 15 years.

What would you change about the village?

I want the woodlands, gardens and lakes in Sudbrooke Park to be taken over by the Parish Council so we can control and maintain them as they should be, and so that everyone in the village can enjoy and take advantage of them.

I am also looking desperately for a better sports field so we can entertain sports like cricket as well as football and encourage more sport here rather than having to rely on Nettleham and Scothern.

Apart from those things, I'm not sure a lot can be done to the village now as it is anyway, although I would like to get more people involved in things.

What is the best thing about living in Sudbrooke?

The peace, quiet and tranqulity. It is a nice place to come to, you feel safe and it is a stone's throw from Lincoln. There are nice walks around the park and there are some good schools in the area.
