

Since April 2018, we have been busy updating our evidence base and preparing a draft of the Neighbourhood Plan taking into consideration the feedback received during previous consultations and the

Neighbourhood Plan process involves a number of stages before it can be completed.

The bulk of the preparation is underway and we are aiming to complete our first draft of the Neighbourhood Plan by early July.

A six-week consultation period will then follow where the community will have the opportunity to view, and make comments, on the proposals.

LATEST UPDATE

▶ Some residents may have heard that WLDC has invested £7,000 in cameras and may not understand the rationale behind the decision, so I thought a few more facts may help people understand the initiative

Councillors approved a policy last year and have recently purchased 12 body cameras to assist officers in their day-to-day work. The council is putting the body worn cameras to use for officers for two main reasons:

- 1. Enhance the safety of employees and members of the public
- 2. Assist with the collection of evidence for offences that we deal with

The council is committed to protecting our staff and members of the public and hopefully the cameras will prevent situations escalating. They are also a great way of gathering

evidence to ensure appropriate action can be carried out in the most efficient way."

The cameras will be used to support staff who deal with a range of issues such as:

- Inspecting land or premises with warrants
- Property inspections
- · Anti-social behaviour
- Environmental Crime

Some staff who carry out inspections in the district have received verbal abuse and threats and the nature of their job means they sometimes go into hostile situations. The cameras will act as a deterrent and will support our staff when carrying out their duties. The practice of using cameras like this is not new as many local authorities and the police have been using them for some time.

A GARDENER'S DELIGHT

A truly lovely garden which gives immeasurable pleasure to both its owners and visitors alike - our thanks to Sandy and David for inviting us to share it with them for the evening.

Visitors are welcomed to the property by a sweeping gravel driveway with central flowerbeds planted for all seasons and filled with Cistus, Hebe, Rock Roses, Geraniums, Lavender and balls of Euonymus.

Following the course of the lawn with large established trees and shrubbery towards the house, we admired the prolific white flowering Pyracantha growing up the exterior and softening the walls of the house - careful trimming resulting in a profusion of orange

berries in the Autumn to be enjoyed by the local birds. There are flowerbeds by the front door with trimmed evergreen conifers and two clipped topiaries have been recently manicured and look very smart indeed.

Upon entering the rear garden, a crazy paved patio and terrace gives a superb view down the garden as it gently slopes away and our eyes were drawn by an archway covered like a blanket in a rose called "Paul's Himalayan Musk"; it's flowers ageing from pale pink through to white. The back of the property has more Pyracantha adorning the walls, the flowers so dense that you cannot see any green leaves; a beautiful pink Rose and a large Wisteria have already flowered for this

year. The garden has an

enveloping feeling of space

and tranquillity throughout. Following the short stream planted either side with flowering perennials that follows the terrace past a second patio down the centre of the garden, there is the gentle sound of running water emanating from a waterfall flowing serenely into the pond where newts, tadpoles, water boatmen and pond skaters are resident. There are curving lawns either side surrounded by borders of beautiful planting.

All our senses are engaged in appreciation of the cornucopia of beautiful Clematis, striking bronze Phormiums, Roses, Poppies, Lupins, ground covering Geraniums, Geum, Box topiary, Hostas and more.

While viewing the borders at eye-level, one's sight is eventually drawn upwards to admire

the rambling white "Seagull" rose which was doing an excellent job of winding its way through the branches of an old fruit tree, creating a superb flowering waterfall effect.

Progressing through the central archway which we had admired from the patio, we notice the very large Willow that was pollarded

some three years ago that is re-establishing it's large fluffy head. With a backdrop of Hornbeam, Silver Birch and some

specimen fir trees, the
bottom of the garden
feels very cosy. The
borders are densely
planted with evergreen
shrubs melting into
each other. The
simplified palette of
colour along with the
shape and texture of the
differing leaves, interspersed with a variety of

perennials, created a restful mood in this area and the song of resident birds filled the air.

Eventually, all members gathered together on the lower patio to participate in the judging of the garlic growing challenge. This was set last October when members were given a single clove to plant in a pot and nurture. As the bulbs were unearthed there was much frivolity.

The diameter of each bulb was measured and recorded - the largest being 64mm and the smallest 31mm. The size difference was mainly due to the largest garlic bulbs having been fed with an onion and leek fertiliser.

There were 17 entries in the keenly contested Flower of the Month competition and it was won by John Whitaker's stunning blue/yellow Iris Reticulata. Sandy Bowles' pale pink Peony came in second place and Janet Stocker's beautifully scented pink Rose was placed third.

The array of flowers was stunning and many thanks to everyone for their participation.

Each of these events has changed the political landscape and has the potential to make a real difference (good or bad) to the way we live our lives. Each of the events will bring change to us and changes to the world.


It's that idea of change that I would like to focus on, for other than death, change is the only thing in our lives we can be certain of. Yet

always find picking blackberries a very therapeutic experience. Nowadays you can find plenty of plastic containers to put them in. When I was a youngster it would have been mum's pudding basin, but more often than not it would have been a blue curry bag. (due to the property bag.)

would have been a blue sugar bag (during the war, when sugar arrived in your local grocers

in a hessian sack, the shopkeeper would fill the standard 16-ounce blue paper bag using a metal scoop). It was paid for in cash, but you would have to hand over your coupons first, as rationing only allowed a very limited quantity.

Mum would empty the contents into the sugar tin and carefully fold up the empty bag for later use! So I often used one for blackberries. It did have a

downside as you may have figured out. By the time the bag was full, the juice would have started to ooze out of the bottom, and unless you kept a close watch on your collection, the bag would burst and the whole lot would end up on the ground, worst still amongst the brambles! And to retrieve them would take the

rest of the day, and almost required a transfusion for the blood loss trying to ease the best ones out from amongst the thorns.

For the past few years we've always managed to pick some, and, mixing them with apples, had some great pies, but in recent times supplies have outstripped demand. I've picked them in Sudbrooke within a stone's throw of my house, but the buildup in the freezer has continued unabated. The other day we were desperately searching for spare freezer

space to contain other stuff. I determined I would have a clear out, and I groped to the bottom of the fore mentioned freezer, and with fingers suffering from second-degree frostbite, discovered umpteen pounds of

blackberries stashed away for a rainy day. What to do with them all?

Well, in recent times, and probably due to

the fact that I've been over indulging for at least the last 70 years, I thought it time I tried to impress my GP by trying to eat a little more healthily. I'd discovered on line that blueberries (yes, you can see where this is going), have many great health giving benefits, but not particularly cheap, and soon go off. I thought the sensible thing to do

would be to check out the nutritional contents of blackberries.

From the Internet: Wikipedia suggest many more health benefits too, so that's it then. Out with the blueberries and in with the black ones! And best of all they're free. Defrost a few at a time, and sprinkle liberally over my Weetabix, they are quite delightful, and I'm

going to live forever!

I guess during the war my breakfasts would have been pretty limited, I'm trying to remember what that might have been. Can some of you oldies remember? I do remember my grandad keeping hens, and occasionally we would have an egg, but that would have been on just rare occasions. Eggs being such a rare luxury, all we could get were powdered ones in a packet. You couldn't fry it or boil it, the only choice was to scramble it. My mum would spoon it out of the packet into a saucepan, and just add a little

milk before stirring it over the gas cooker. It tasted perfectly alright to me, having really known nothing else.

A favourite in wintertime was barley kernels. They tasted a little bit like porridge oats, mixed with hot milk, but probably cheaper. A packet cost just over one pence.

We also had toast of course, often spread with dripping (pig fat). The other food I enjoyed was some dark brown sweet sticky stuff that mum spread on our bread, called malt. It came in a jar and was mixed with cod liver oil, packed with vitamin C, and I expect it was given mainly to prevent colds, but

probably other things too. You can still buy it online today.

With antibiotics not having yet been invented, mum and dad did everything to keep us children safe, of course. I don't remember if my parents had to pay the doctor before the National Health Service came in, but it certainly was easier to see the doctor then than it appears to be these days.

There weren't any health centres of course, doctors just practised on their own. My doctor, Dr Larsen, converted his attached garage into a waiting room, and the procedure was to simply turn up at his house, and join the queue. No appointment was necessary. When he had seen

everyone, he would set off in his car to visit any of his patients that for whatever reason couldn't make it to the surgery.

He would most definitely let you know if you could have turned up to his place and didn't. There was no backup day or night, and if need be he would visit day or night.

I don't really remember ever being ill other than having the odd cold, and having a dose of chicken pox, but I do recall just once giving my

parents a worrying time. I'd fallen over and hurt my knee (a regular occurrence), but this time it followed up with pain in my groin. Dr Larsen

diagnosed that my leg had become septic, and with no antibiotics available in those days, the poison would have to be drawn out with a poultice of Kaolin (I believe it's still used for the same thing in horses).

The poultice was heated up in the tin it came in, and applied directly on the open wound of my knee. I would scream with pain, but slowly it did the trick, and in the end was grateful for the treatment.

Last month I mentioned a country that I had visited a few years ago that had no bus service. (in fact no buses), with answers on the back of a £20 note. With no replies I'm £20 the poorer, but it was the Falkland Islands.
