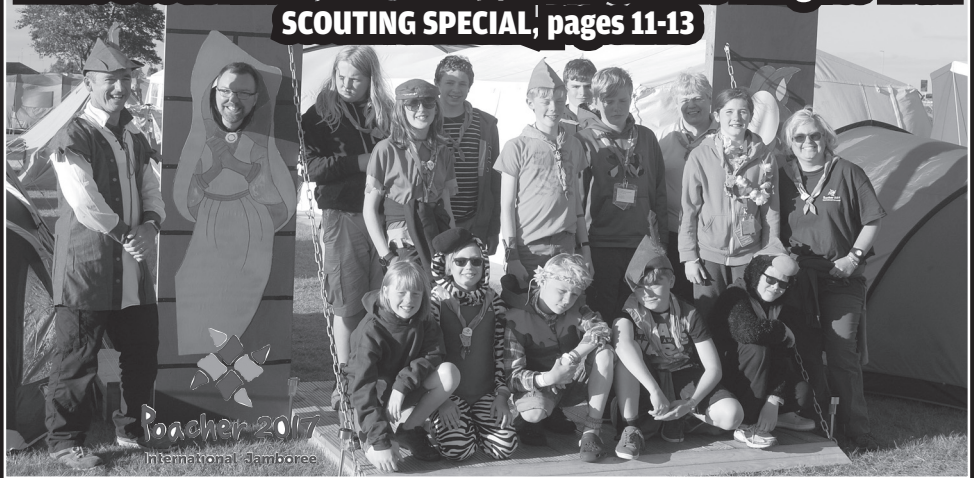

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

May 2017

Notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Wednesday 14 June in the Sudbrooke Village Hall.

PRESENT:

Councillors Peter Heath (Chair), Bob Waller, Paul Rignall, Andy Cottam, Ian Russell, Mrs Lyn Etheridge, Mrs Christine Myers (Clerk), 3 residents (until 8) Mr D Picksley (Editor of **Sudbrooke News**) (until 8)

39) Parishioners' Items

■ **Main Drive - Access:** Residents present raised concerns about the proposals made by the developers of Sudbrooke Park, feeling that there should be a physical barrier rather than visual only. An actuated barrier would stop unauthorised access to Main Drive though would present a small inconvenience to existing residents.

It was felt that the Parish Council does not wish to be seen to promote one solution over another without the support of the majority of residents in the Park who have access to Main Drive and would therefore suggest that the developers send out details of the schemes to residents for comments.

■ **Wild Flower area Jubilee Garden:** A resident had commented that this area was tatty and requires more maintenance. This was noted and the matter be reviewed in the autumn.

40) Sudbroke News

■ This was an agenda item and the Chairman brought it to the beginning of the meeting in order that the Editor could join in the discussion. Correspondence had been received by the Editor inviting his comments on amalgamating Sudbrooke with neighbouring villages to produce a monthly magazine for all the villages. It was felt that it could develop into a 'glossy' magazine with many adverts and little relevance to Sudbrooke.

The Parish Council Resolved unanimously that Sudbrooke currently has an excellent magazine and Editor and that it carry on exclusive to Sudbrooke.

The Editor had also sought quotations from six printers. It was noted that the current printers, Lonsdale Direct Solutions Ltd were still the most economical. Resolved unanimously that the printing be continued by Lonsdale.

The Editor was thanked by the Chairman for obtaining quotations and his continued efforts in producing an informative magazine.

41) Signature of Declaration of Office of Vice-Chairman

■ Councillor Bob Waller, having been elected as Vice Chairman at the Annual meeting of the Parish Council, duly signed his Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

42) Apologies

■ Councillors Miss Rose Dobbs, Stuart Curtis, County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins, Mrs Bridget Solly Treasurer. Resolved that the reasons for absence be accepted.

43) Notes of Meeting held on May 11, 2017

■ Amendment - minute 33 delete 'No comment'. Save for the above the notes were approved and Resolved that they be signed as Minutes.

44) Police Matters

- May 26 - Police alert received: Burglaries in Fiskerton and Cherry Willingham

45) County/District Councillors' Reports

- None received.

46) Reports on Matters Outstanding

- **a) Clerk's New sportsfield/tennis courts tidying - use of National Citizen Service Action 2017 programme:** A representative would carry out a Risk Assessment of the works required on June 22. Resolved that Councillors Peter Heath, Bob Waller and the Clerk to attend.
- **b) Village sign:** LCC Highways had stated that the sign should be sited three metres from the edge of the carriageway. It was suggested that an item with photos of the sign be included in the next **Sudbrooke News** inviting residents to design a mounting for the sign/alternative locations for siting Resolved unanimously as above.
- **c) Painting of Park gates:** A reply from Lincoln College had stated that it would now not be possible to undertake the work this year, but suggested that if early contact be made next year it was hoped that students could undertake the painting as a project next summer. Resolved that the College be contacted in March 2018.

■ d) Highway matters:

- (i) LCC Highway amenity cutting in village - The Clerk reported that she had been informed that the verges fronting homes on Wragby Road were not included in the amenity cutting as previous. Members hoped that residents would cut in front of their houses, but in the meantime the Clerk was asked to obtain a quotation for the length of Wragby Road from the junction of Scothern Lane to the parish boundary.
 - (ii) **Update on works in village:** LCC Highways had infilled over 200 potholes in Sudbrooke. LCC Highways are still working with Anglian Water regards to reinstatement of Nettleham Lane. It is likely that there will be a road closure for the works required.
 - Church Lane - Surface dressing of the highway is programmed for the highway before October 2017 and the footway will be slurry sealed this year.
 - Scothern Lane footway - this will be slurry sealed before the autumn. However, the area under the trees at the junction of Holme Drive will not be undertaken as this requires additional preparation works prior to sealing.
- The Asset Team are looking at possible reconstruction of some areas of carriageway within the village.

48) Planning Matters

■ **a) Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan – Report on grant repayment:** This repayment was still under review.

■ **b) Proposals for Main Drive by developer:** This had been discussed with parishioners present at the beginning of the meeting. Resolved unanimously that a letter be written to the developers asking that they survey residents in The Park on the proposals for Main Drive.

■ **c) Section 106 Agreement, Poachers Lane:** This had been forwarded to the Parish Council Solicitors for checking prior to signing, therefore deferred until a future meeting of the Parish Council.

■ **d) TPO Application 039849 – 12 Broad Dale Close, Sudbrooke:** Members having viewed the application had made the following comments which had been forwarded to WLDC Trees Officer:-

“Sudbrooke Parish Council strongly objects to this application for the following reasons:

1. The beech appears a large healthy mature specimen. The trunk is approximately five metres away from the property. A number of large lower limbs have previously been removed. No branches overhang the property.

The two sycamores are further away from the property, behind the beech, seemingly causing very little threat to the property. Safety risk from the three trees therefore appears very low.

2 The Parish Council does not accept that shading the property is a valid reason for TPO tree work.

3. The application states that “amenity value would not be affected greatly because the trees are barely visible from the road”. This is clearly not the case. The trees form a positive backdrop to this row of properties, forming part of the woodland setting. Tops of trees are visible from road. Application also fails to recognise that this area of woodland, including these three trees, is shortly to become Public Open Space as part of the conditions for the recently approved major Park Development.

The trees are therefore of considerable amenity benefit. Sudbrooke Parish Council recommends that a site visit by the Tree Officer is essential.”

■ **e) Permission granted:** 136075 - 563 Holme Drive - single storey extension.

NATIONAL CITIZEN SERVICE

A JOB WELL DONE



■ Sudbrooke has been fortunate to have an action team from the National Citizen Service descend upon it for a week in August. The NCS is a scheme run for 16/17 year olds to enable them to work as part of a team on a community project - the work which they plan and undertake themselves, thus gaining some experience for including on their CVs.

The Parish Council had asked for a team to tidy the areas of the tennis court, frontage of the Village Hall and the changing cabin on the new sportsfield.

Fifteen young people arrived on the Monday morning having had little instruction on what it was they were going to be doing in Sudbrooke!

However, after a short meeting with the Chairmen of the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee and a discussion with their mentors - two third year university students - they set about planning the work.

On the Tuesday they did some shopping. Residents may have spotted them walking along Sothorn Lane from the bus stop armed with

sweeping brushes, secateurs, huge cans of fence paint and paint brushes.



The changing cabin on the new sportsfield has not been used for several years and was covered with brambles and ivy. They cleared all this enabling it to be used again when required.

The tennis court boards around the court were prepared before painting, all the weeds coming through removed and the courts swept.

The frontage of the Village Hall was swept and tidied and the debris filled two wheely bins with

soil and moss. There were numerous bags of cuttings which WLDC removed for us very promptly. The Team worked enthusiastically for the week and the finished work exceeded all expectations. The tennis court is now much improved - take a look - it appears so much lighter and it is hoped will now be used more.

A busy week and a credit to these young people who decided to do some worthwhile community work during the school break. Job well done!

KEEP THOSE HEDGES IN ORDER

One of the pleasures of living in a small village away from main roads is the ability to have a walk in the sunshine and enjoy the sights and sounds of village life. Sadly that is not always the case in Sudbrooke.

We have footpaths and pavements aplenty, but often they are blocked by overgrown hedges forcing a person to step round either onto a grass verge or worse the road.

A relatively easy thing for the able bodied, but less so for those with pushchairs and almost impossible and very dangerous for those in wheelchairs. Ideally, two people should be able to pass each other or walk side by side.

I fully understand the gardener's pride and joy in presenting a well trimmed hedge around the boundary to one's house, but how far outside the boundary does it have to go to be a menace to pedestrians? When planted up, those small beech saplings, privet or conifers look lost against the size of the plot so they are put against the boundary. As they grow, with each successive cut a small amount of growth is left, after all what's a small overhang of the pathway?

After several years it does become significant. On every road in the village there are examples of this overgrowth onto the footpath despite the hedge being regularly trimmed.

I ask every householder to look at their exterior hedge and ask themselves does this cause an obstruction to passersby or prevent wheelchair access and could I be liable for the consequences of any accident caused by my luxuriant hedge?

POACHER 2017

■ During the first week of the school holidays, over 4000 young people and 2000 older people camped at the Lincolnshire Showground. Why?

To take part in the 10th International Scout and Guide Camp organised by the scouts and guides of Lincolnshire - Poacher 2017. This event takes place every four years, but because of the 2012 Olympics (when all the portable toilets in the UK were otherwise booked!) it slipped a year.

So the end of July saw 14 scouts and five leaders pack their rucksacks and sleeping bags to camp for the whole week. A careful watch was kept on the weather forecasts and we were lucky over the majority of the week to have reasonable conditions.

There were scouts and guides from all over the United Kingdom, as well as locals from Welton and Nettleham. There were overseas visitors from Norway, Russia, America, Canada, Hong Kong, USA, New Zealand and

Australia to name just a few. Our Sub-Camp was Historical Legends and each camp had to choose their own theme and build a gateway.

The Scouts had earlier chosen Robin Hood and so the leaders built a castle gateway, complete with drawbridge, to the scouts' design, including photo opportunity of being Robin Hood or Maid Marian.

After setting up camp on Saturday and the official opening ceremony followed by a disco, sleep was a bit sparse.

Sunday saw the start of the activities. Our Scouts went off and kayaked, climbed, scuba'd, made crafts, shot air-rifles, catapults and arrows, swam (one way to ensure they had a wash!), zip-wired, and many more things.

There were enough activities to please everyone, though the high winds curtailed some of the activities during the week.

One of our Scouts, Edward, managed to have a go at every activity on offer - around 65 different ones. Another slept out overnight a bivouac shelter.

2017 EXPEDITION

HIKE TO THE BATTLE OF BRITAIN MEMORIAL FLIGHT MUSEUM AT RAF CONINGSBY

Upon pickup, we were absolutely exhausted and very glad to go home, but we also carried many memories and experiences from the weekend with us... some good, and some rather not so.

I enjoyed the expedition because it was fun and I spent time with my friends, but I also found it a little difficult and tiring as I am sure many others did too. Overall I did enjoy the weekend as I like camping and didn't mind the walking as it contributed to my Expedition Challenge Award.

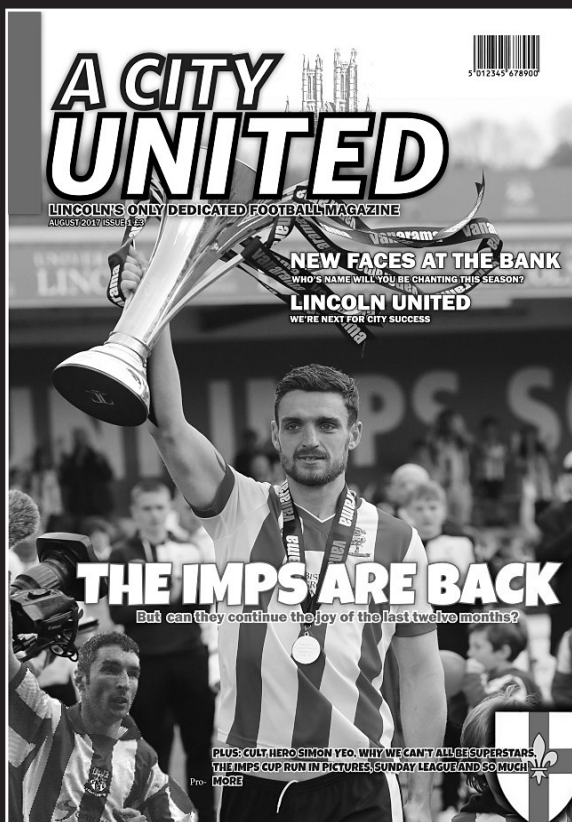

INFLUENZA VACCINES

■ It has come around to that time of year again and we are currently planning our 'flu vaccination clinics.

Annual seasonal influenza immunisation is recommended for people in the following groups, who are more at risk of the complications of influenza, including:

- All people aged 65 years and older (including all those aged 65 years on or before March 31, 2017).
- All people aged six months to under 65 years in the following clinical risk groups:
 - ▶ Chronic respiratory disease
 - ▶ Chronic heart disease
 - ▶ Chronic liver disease
 - ▶ Chronic neurological disease
 - ▶ Diabetes mellitus
 - ▶ Immunosuppression
 - ▶ Asplenia or splenic dysfunction
 - ▶ Pregnant women
 - ▶ Morbid obesity (BMI 40+)

Seasonal influenza immunization is recommended in certain healthy people to reduce the risk of transmission to vulnerable groups, including:

- ▶ Children aged 2 years to under 8 years old on 31 August 2016 (including children of appropriate age for school years 1, 2, and 3), as part of the national childhood influenza immunization programme.
- ▶ People living in long-stay residential and nursing homes or other long-stay care facilities (not including prisons, young offender's institutions, or university halls of residence).
- ▶ Household contacts of immunocompromised people, including carers (people who expect to share living accommodation on most days over the winter).
- ▶ People in receipt of a carer's allowance, or those who are the main carer of an elderly or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill. This should be considered on an individual basis, at the healthcare professional's discretion, and may include children who are carers.

■ There is currently a national shortage of Hepatitis A and B vaccines and as a result practices are unable to obtain further stocks. If you think that you may need one of these vaccines over the forthcoming months, please discuss this with one of our Practice Nurses who will be able to advise you further.

FRIENDS AND FAMILY TEST

■ For the last three years, the Practice has been taking part in the national 'Friends and Family Test' which asks patients if they would recommend the Practice to family and friends.

The feedback from these questionnaires is used to transform NHS services and support patient choice. Even if you have completed one of these before, we would be grateful if you would fill in a survey regularly so that we can feed this information back to NHS England. The surveys take less than a minute to complete and we would greatly appreciate your support.
