December 2013

87) Parishoners items

■ Thanks were extended to the team who had erected and set up the village Christmas tree and to all those who had helped out at the switch on of the tree lights on December 1.

— 88) Police matters —————

Mention was made of a car leaving the road on Scothern Lane near to Holme Drive. The driver had reportedly been using his mobile phone at the time of the incident.

– 89) County Councillor's report —————

CC Sue Rawlins stated that she hoped she could arrange for the funding of the installation of the posts made by the carving group when they were completed.

—— 90) District Councillor's report ——

■ DC Stuart Curtis informed the meeting that the pre-hearing of the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Core Strategy examination by the Planning Inspector would be held at the Bentley Hotel South Hykeham on December 12, 2013

91) Notes of meeting held on November 7

■ Proposed as a correct record by Councillor P Rignall, seconded by Councillor S Curtis.

92) Reports on matters outstanding

- a) **Vandalism to Millennium stone lights** Cllr Martin Dickie had arranged for the millennium stone lights to be replaced/repaired which would be covered by the Parish Council insurance except for the excess of £125.00.
- **b) Winter gritting** Notification had been received from Aon, the Parish Council insurers, stating that if gritting was undertaken by the Parish Council the procedure must continue until the bad weather ends and all gritting logged and recorded.

It was agreed therefore that it was not possible to make such a commitment; therefore no gritting would be undertaken by the Parish Council.

— 93) Highway matters –

- a) **Dip in road Sudbrooke Road, Scothern:** This had again been reported to Highways who had stated that work would be carried out during the 2014/15 financial year. In the meantime temporary signing would be erected.
- b) **Reply from Highways re A158 Closure/traffic diversions:** A negative reply had been received from the Executive Director for Communities regarding the impact of diverting traffic through Sudbrooke in the event of a closure of the A158.
- c) Willow tree, Scothern Lane: Attention had been drawn by a resident to an overhanging willow tree on Scothern Lane. It was felt that there were several trees overhanging verges and footways and the Clerk was asked to write to the residents concerned drawing their attention to the requirement for cutting back.

96) Planning =

Report on meeting held with Planning Officer/Truelove re: cycleway to Nettleham.

A report of the meeting held between members of the Parish Council, Highways Officers and representatives of Mr Paul Truelove had been summarised as follows by Simon Sharp, Senior Growth Strategy and Project Officers, WLDC:

- 1) The pathway is required to contribute to the sustainability of the proposal.
- 2) The applicant and WLDC are not keen on the securing of the footpath directly adjacent to the road due to:
- The costs implications (unlikely to be reasonable in the context of the development proposed)
 - The resultant "suburbanisation" of the lane.
- 3) There was an understanding that the pathway could only extend to the parish boundary. The reasons for this restriction are twofold:
 - The provision needs to be reasonably related in scale to the development.
- There would need to be the agreement of Nettleham PC if the path went further than the parish boundary.
- 4) There was a consensus to pursue the alignment of the pathway on the field side of the hedge (see point 2 above).
- 5) LCC would adopt the pathway and flanking verges subject to:
 - The provision of the path to an adoptable standard.
- The connection between and around the two bends to the existing pavement already having already been completed as adopted highway.
- There is a management regime in place and agreement with the Parish Council to undertake the maintenance of the hedge between the carriageway and the pathway. This is likely to involve a flail cut. Such an agreement would need to be included in a \$106 agreement.

However, LCC would be willing to adopt the pathway without the connection through to Nettleham village.

6) It would only be reasonable to expect a percentage of the housing to be delivered in advance of the completion of the footpath (this to be negotiated between WLDC and the applicant) and the phasing included in the 106 agreement.

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7) It is acknowledged that a considerable period of time has elapsed since the first submission of the application in June 2012, and given the reliance on the provision of the footpath link between the bends, the applicant may wish to reflect on the current position and decide to look at other ways of securing the proposal as a sustainable development. Such reflection could be undertaken now or the applicant may wish to enter into the agreement as outlined above but review it with the other parties if the pathway between the bends fails to materialise.

Mr Sharp concluded by stating that he would await to hear from the applicant as to whether they wish to pursue the proposal with the pathway as outlined above.

Meeting with Mr Nigel Wilkinson:

Members of the Parish Council had met with Mr Wilkinson who had shown them around his farm business and explained his thoughts for the future of Sudbrooke Park. It was emphasised that any plans for future development were still being drawn up.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Brief report of meeting held on January 9, 2014

Parking Problems: Residents have mentioned that they are not able to have clear vision for pulling out in the vicinity of the shop due to vehicles parking on or very close to the junction. Often vans are parked in that area which obstructs vision.

Similar problems are being experienced near to the church with vehicles parking on the footpath, blocking it entirely in some cases for pedestrians. It is accepted that this is a narrow road, but if it is difficult to find a parking spot on Church Lane, the Village Hall car park is available for use, albeit is a bit of a stroll.

It would be appreciated if drivers could give a bit of thought when parking in either area

■ **Police Report:** The Sudbrooke sign and grit box on Nettleham/Sudbrooke Lane has taken a battering from a red vehicle, obvious by the amount of paint left on the grit box! The sign is going to be costly to replace and the Police would be interested to know of a red vehicle in the area which has obviously got quite a bit of body damage.

A box of out-of-date magazines was taken from outside the shop and dumped near Northfield Park, presumably when it was realised that the box had no value.

■ A158 Closure - Traffic Diversions: As many residents will be aware, the A158 was closed at the beginning of November on two occasions due to a gas leak. Mayhem was caused through Sudbrooke, Scothern and Nettleham, with the traffic all being diverted through these villages. Our Chairman, Peter Heath, wrote to the Police Commissioner and the Director of Development at Lincolnshire County Council Highways Department - a copy of Peter's letter and also the respective replies are printed in this magazine. Unfortunately they are considered not very helpful replies.

The Parish Council are liaising with Nettleham Parish Council as to whether some arrangement could be agreed about the use of Church Lane/Nettleham Lane in the event of future closures of the A158.

■ Village Sign: A resident has written to the Parish Council stating that he does not consider the Parish Council have consulted the residents of Sudbrooke sufficiently about the creation of a village sign.

Designs/suggestions of a sign have been mentioned several times in **Sudbrooke News** since May 2010 following its instigation by the Parish Plan Committee in March 2010.

Unfortunately the previous designs have proved too expensive to pursue, but the latest one using our own wood from Sudbrooke Park, carved by our Village Carving Group, will hopefully be successful. The cost involved for this will be a metal 'Sudbrooke' plate and the siting which should be covered by a grant.

March 1, venue to be agreed and walkers should meet at the village hall at 9.30am.

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

MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

■ Bonjour! Hola¡ Guten Tag! Our children are growing up in a global community and at Ellison Boulters we aim to provide them with the skills they need to become international citizens of the future.

The government has recently announced that languages will become compulsory for all children from the age of 7 right through to 14, in order to allow us to compete on an equal footing in the global business community.

At Ellison Boulters, children learn French from Year 2 through to Year 6, and we are fortunate to be able to offer support to other schools because our languages curriculum is so well-established.

Children learn finger rhymes, sing songs, watch video clips, read stories and interact with each other in French, as well as developing their knowledge of phonics and beginning to write in French.

Learning a language supports and underpins the work children do in literacy; learning about word class, tense and sentence structure are all key skills for linguists which have a positive impact on the development of literacy.

From Year 3, children write book reviews of stories they have read in French, as well as developing confidence in speaking aloud, and fine-tuning listening skills. But learning

a language is not all about words and phrases; intercultural understanding is a key part of what we teach in French lessons and it is these skills that make us part of one big global community. Children start by considering what languages they hear in school and in our local community and they move onto looking at ways of travelling to France, focusing on specific French artists and composers.

As they move towards the upper end of the school, the children begin to challenge stereotypes by identifying what makes us similar to people from other cultures and they consider how themes such as homelessness are portrayed in the stories they encounter.

Neither should language learning be confined to just one language; we endeavour to ensure that all children have the opportunity to experience taster sessions in German before moving on to secondary school.

HEALTH CROSSROADS =

Do you know what? There are so many myths to do with getting healthy and staying healthy. Here's one that I think will surprise you. And it was reported as a myth in the medical journal, Lancet, so I reckon it's pretty accurate.

Here goes: It is a myth that we need to drink eight pints of water a day, even though everybody you speak to repeats it as an irrefutable fact.

Lancet could find no evidence at all to support the statement. Of course, it's in the interests of the bottled-water companies to keep perpetuating the myth because it boosts their sales and profits. And of course, it doesn't mean that we should stop drinking water - it's just plain common sense that we need to keep hydrated. But we don't need to be guzzling it every hour of the day.

So why am I going on about myths? Well, I'll tell you - and it rocked me back on my heels when I learned it. Dr Tom Yates, who is



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a senior researcher in health at Leicester Uni, has been collecting all the evidence to do with the causes of death in mature adults.

All the usual suspects were there:

Smoking: yes that's pretty bad and contributes to a good proportion of deaths.

High cholesterol: yes that was there too. High blood pressure: yes.

Obesity: yes, but further down the list than I would have expected.

Alcohol: yes, a bit.

But the highest factor - so high it was nearly off the scale and FOUR TIMES higher than the next cause was: wait for it - LACK OF EXERCISE.

Let's put it another way. You can smoke, drink, eat all the wrong foods and be overweight, but if you do exercise, you are four times more likely to live a long life than if you did all of those things, but didn't exercise.

In order to be healthier, live a longer life, and actually feel better you need to exercise – and without wishing to boast, that's what we do best. Apart from a tiny minority, most people don't actually find exercise easy, particularly if they try to do it on their own. That's why regular gyms make so much money. People sign up for a year in a rush of enthusiasm, but after a few weeks, stop going.

Dear Editor,

A couple of years ago, residents appealed to the Parish Council through *Sudbrooke News*, and by other channels, to be provided with a village allotment site.

As they were required to do by **The Allotments Act of 1972 as amended by The Act of May 2002**, they had to prove a need for such site and if enough support was in fact proved, which it was.

Then the Parish Council were obliged by that Act to provide an allotment site.

I know the Parish Council did try to find a suitable site and at one stage investigated the possibility that, if we could not have our own site in the village we amalgamated with Scothern to have a site halfway between us.

They were unable to get one despite several valiant efforts.

A fairly recent planning application proposal for building new houses behind the church offered to provide an allotment site in the proposed development.

Since then, though, nothing has been heard about either the allotment site or the

proposed houses. Perhaps this is an appropriate juncture to remind the Parish Council that they are obliged by law to provide for residents, allotments where a need for them has been proved - which it was - and to ask what steps they are continuing to take to provide allotments now the need is there.

A quick click on GOOGLE will reveal a mass of relevant legislation and interesting information about the need of Local Councils to provide allotments, but the most relevant Act was **The Allotments Act of 23 May 2012**, **which updated and amended the Act of 1972** endorsing the requirement of local authorities to provide sites.

This followed the successful suing of Liverpool Council for failing to provide a suitable site - this seems a harsh thing to have to resort to.

A surprising fact was that the requirement of a mere six residents was required.

Our village list was far in excess of that number, so let's hope we get our allotments...

SAVE MONEY ON YOUR GAS & ELECTRIC BILLS WITH LINCOLNSHIRE ENERGY SWITCH SCHEME

Gas and electricity customers in Lincolnshire could save money on their home energy bills through the new collective Lincolnshire Energy Switch scheme (LESS).

Seven authorities in the county have jointly launched the campaign that invites residents to join forces and potentially save hundreds of pounds on their bills.

Energy suppliers can offer lower energy prices to a collective contract made up of thousands of customers. The more people that sign up, the lower the energy prices that could be offered. People who have never switched energy supplier and are on a standard tariff are likely to make the greatest savings.

The scheme is easy to join by registering your details at:

www.west-lindsey.gov.uk/switch or alternatively residents can call 01522 782067 (it has been found that it is easier to ring rather than using the web link). In West Lindsey, residents can also visit the council offices to register.

Opening times at the Guildhall, Gainsborough are Monday and Tuesday, 8.30am-5pm, Wednesday 8.30am-3.30pm, Thursday, 8.30am-6pm, Friday, 8.30am-4.30pm. Once the registration deadline has passed on Monday 17 February, the tariff of the lowest bidding energy supplier will be offered to residents. Residents are then able to choose to accept the offer or not.

People on pre-payment meters can also choose to switch.

Once registered, there is no obligation to switch. When the auction has been completed customers will receive an offer letter by email or post if registration was made 'offline'.

Customers then have four weeks to confirm they wish to switch supplier by following the instructions in the offer email or returning a signed form by post.

Cllr Jeff Summers, leader of West Lindsey District Council said: "We are encouraging as many residents to choose to make the change to the Lincolnshire Energy Switch scheme and to work with iChoosr for a community switch here in Lincolnshire.

"We are always keen to look at new ways to help our residents reduce their monthly outgoings and start a process to help those most in need address real fuel poverty. Remember registration closes on February 17 so register to switch as soon as possible."

During the last week the A158 has had to be closed on two occasions owing to a gas leak between North Greetwell and Sudbrooke. The resulting traffic chaos has been a frustrating experience for residents and drivers. The road was closed without putting into place any diversion notices which led to 2-way traffic down Church lane Sudbrooke with heavy goods vehicles and buses negotiating a single track road with few passing places.

Traffic was allowed to flow in both directions with the result that motorists were having to pass by mounting the kerb/ roadside verge with resulting damage to the grips. Two Parish Councillors sought the permission of our PCSO to attempt to control the entrance and exit of traffic into Church Lane from Sudbrooke and explain to bewildered drivers the reason for the problem and suggest possible alternative routes to reach Lincoln. Such efforts were not always appreciated. At approximately 3pm they had to withdraw for safety reasons due to the heavy rain and failing daylight.

There are frequent problems that necessitate the closure of the A158 between the A15 roundabout and Cherry Tree Café. This traffic chaos could have been avoided had the police and highways put into practice the agreement reached several years ago for a one way system to operate along Church Lane in this eventuality. Has this procedure been lost and is unknown between the agencies of Police and Highways or is it that you do not have the manpower to operate it? Either way I request that you look at your respective solutions to the requirement for a rapid response to a recurring problem. Inconvenience to residents and drivers has to be expected and accepted in the event of an emergency but it does not have to be a drama as well.

RE: A158 CLOSURE - TRAFFIC DIVERSIONS

I refer to your letter dated 8 November 2013 regarding the emergency closure of the A158 due to a major gas leak and the impact of diverting traffic on Sudbrooke village.

I am aware that you discussed your concerns with my Area Highways Manager, Mr Alan Brown, at a site meeting on 18 November 2013 and he explained the difficulties which arise during unplanned closures on the A158. The key issue is the lack of any suitable diversion routes capable of carrying the HGV traffic normally routing along the A158. The signed diversion route put into place during any closure is from Wragby via Market Rasen. However, during the first response phase by the Police, officers are focussed on the safety of those involved at the incident site, usually as a result of a traffic accident and the Police will put in place a very localised closure, with traffic being left to find its own way around the closure.

The Police call upon the County Council as Highway Authority, to put in place more formalised division route signing when they believe the road will be blocked for any significant period of time, but given that the County Council are not a front line emergency service, its contractors quickest response will be 1 hour. When the significant timescale required to sign the long diversion route for the A158 is added to their mobilisation time it can typically take up to 3 hours to close the route to through traffic. However, given the need for extensive local access between Wragby and Lincoln and the complexity of closing side roads with associated local diversion signing, it is simply not possible to prevent significant traffic volumes seeking to use routes such as the one through Sudbrooke. County Council staff therefore focus on diverting as much HGV traffic as possible.

The A158 is one of the most difficult routes to provide diversions around and this problem is reflected in our policy of only undertaking planned closures during off peak times, i.e. at nights or on Sundays.


I note your comments regarding the establishing of a signed or managed one way system through Sudbrooke during emergency closure. However, we would not want to include the village in any formalised routes. Regrettably the County Council and Police do not have the resources to deal with traffic generated by people who have local knowledge and use non designated routes.

I am sorry that I cannot assure you that similar difficulties will not reoccur in the event of a future emergency closure.

Thank you for your correspondence to Mr Hardwick concerning the closure of the A158 near to Sudbrooke, Lincoln at the beginning of November 2013 following a serious gas leak in the main gas supply pipe. I have now been updated by my community policing inspector, Inspector Outen, who attended the location in person on the first occasion and I can now update you accordingly.

As you identify the A158 was closed on a couple of occasions due to a leak in the main gas supply pipe that runs alongside the road. As this is a main supply pipe, the gas supply cannot be closed off, and repairs must take place with gas still flowing albeit at a reduced pressure. Consequently an escape of gas will continue into the atmosphere until the leak is sealed, and with this comes inherent risks, which we seek to mitigate by implementing an appropriate exclusion zone. On this occasion we were fortunate that there was no evacuation of properties required owing to the location of the leak. However, after liaison with the national grid gas experts, a closure of the A158 was required to exclude the general public whilst repairs were undertaken.

Unfortunately due to the location, this was a resource intensive exercise, with resources attending from across the Lincoln and West Lindsey District to assist in the road closures. This process is always dependent upon the availability of those resources, other ongoing incidents and the time taken to get those resources to the location.

From the call for assistance being received to initial resources attending on the first occasion took approximately 25 minutes, with the priority being to close the A158 to through traffic past the site of the leak. Unfortunately resourcing only enabled this closure to be initially staffed, and diverted traffic, took its own path often travelling down Church Lane. After establishing that the repairs would take some time, county highways were asked to attend and assist with signing those closures, whilst additional police resources were directed to attend to assist in additional traffic control.

Regrettably, despite road closure signs, members of the travelling public often choose to ignore the signs and drive round them, continuing their journey along the closed road. On this occasion we even had vehicles driving round the police cars blocking the road whilst our staff were dealing with other members of the public, or preferring to argue as to why the closure should not apply to them.

Consequently we were unable to release our staff from the initial main closure to direct traffic away from Church Lane. In this modern day we are also frustrated by the scourge of the Satellite Navigation System, which on being turned off the main A158, immediately redirected individuals onto Church Lane / Sudbrooke Lane, and it was only some time into the incident that we managed to get staff to the Church Lane / Sudbrooke Lane junction in Nettleham, and prevent traffic taking that route.

We also experienced on the initial occasion a delay in the attendance of highways to assist in placing a full closure on the A158, which was not further helped by a lack of signage on their part to fully close the road, before going on to sign the appropriate diversion routes. Lincolnshire as a whole will always suffer with the closure of a major road in an emergency with a lack of suitable diversion routes, with the road network containing many small country lanes. This takes time for highways staff to complete the signage due to the distances and many minor junctions to sign. Whilst historically people would stick to the main routes and obey road closure signs, modern day 'sat navs' will put drivers on unfamiliar and frankly unsuitable roads, often directing them back into the road closure itself. Consequently we have to place more staff on closures than we did historically, and it is not something we can always fully facilitate depending on the exact location of the incident.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank your Parish Councillors who kindly assisted my staff in trying to manage the traffic, and as you allude to not always sympathetic drivers, through this difficult period. I would also like to reassure you that we endeavour to minimise disruption to local communities during closures such as these, but there will always be some degree of inconvenience whilst we muster staff to attend at the locations involved. We often find that our problems occur with the diversionary routes quicker than we can get additional staff to the location, but we do our utmost to do this as swiftly as possible within our available resourcing. We continue to work closely with highways during such closures, but inevitably there will always be a conflict between the time taken to arrive and assist us, and the high volume of traffic on main arterial routes.

CYBER BULLYING: Part One

Cyber bullying occurs when electronic communications such as text messages, emails, instant messages, and social media updates are used to threaten or humiliate someone. Its consequences can be just as serious as the effects of bullying that occurs in person. Learn how to recognize and address cyber bullying before it gets out of hand.

Look for signs of harassment.

Cyber bullying often takes the form of one person harassing another through emails, instant messages, text messages or other modes of electronic communication. Harassment is taking place if the bully is directly contacting someone with one or more of the following types of messaging:

- ◆ Hateful or threatening verbal messages. This includes name-calling, attempts to control someone's behavior by threatening to expose embarrassing information and/or threats of violence.
- Embarrassing or threatening images.
- ◆ An unending barrage of emails, instant messages, or texts, whether or not they are threatening in nature.

Look for signs of public humiliation.

Another common form of cyber bullying happens when the bully harasses a target by way of public embarrassment, rather than directly contacting him or her. Cyber bullies may use these public tactics:

• Posting humiliating messages on a social media site, a blog, or another public space.

- Spreading rumors and gossip using social media, text messages and other tools.
- ◆ Sharing pictures that are embarrassing or explicit in nature, or are altered with the intent to humiliate, on social media websites and through text messaging.
- Creating a website filled with defamatory images, insults, and rumors about the target.

Look for signs of impersonation.

A less obvious, but equally harmful form of cyberbullying takes place when the bully attacks someone by impersonating him or her as a way to bring about humiliation or punishment. In this case it is more difficult to identify the perpetrator.

In some cases the bully may create a screen name nearly identical to the screen name used by someone, then use that name to create embarrassing or threatening situations for him or her.

The bully may steal the target's password, hack his or her accounts, and send embarrassing messages to others or make expensive purchases.

Attempt to identify the cause. Some bullies start out as a friend, an ex, or someone else you know well. If it seems possible to have a reasonable discussion with the person, consider asking him or her to stop. Have the conversation in person.

Keep in mind there may not always be a reason for cyber bullying, or one that is straightforward. Sometimes people lash out on others because of their own insecurities. In any case, it is not your fault.

A review of polling districts and polling places is currently underway and the district council is particularly interested in offering reasonable facilities for both able bodied and disabled voters.

Leader of the Council, ClIr Jeff Summers, said: "In reality this is not always possible and we have little choice about premises. However, we are conducting a review of all polling places and paying particular attention to availability of parking and disabled parking as well as the approaches to buildings."

Cllr Summers also pointed out that where the choice of fully accessible premises is restricted, as in smaller communities, then any voter can now apply for a postal vote. Currently the
