PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

———— July 2014 —

Abridged notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 10 July in Sudbrooke Village Hall. The full set of notes may be seen in Nettleham Library or on the Parish website.

– 28)Open forum for Parishioners items –

■ A resident produced a copy of Nettleham's Neighbourhood Plan and enquired if it was thought it would be useful for Sudbrooke to produce one. Members felt that a Neighbourhood Plan was more suited to larger villages.

A resident had raised concern about the poor surface of the highway on Holme Drive. Reports of deep potholes would continue to be reported to the Highways Department. Residents were also encouraged to make reports.

It was noted that the dog bin outside of the Village Hall had been damaged.

– 29) Police Matters —

Concern was raised about continued dangerous parking of vehicles on St Edward's Drive near to Oak Close, this being on a blind bend. The Clerk was asked to bring this to the attention of residents in **Sudbrooke News**.

A further report was given as follows:

- ▶ 06/2014: There was a car fire on the A158, this was extinguished and removed.
- ▶ 06/06/2014: There was an RTC between a car and pushbike on Elm Drive the cyclist sustained minor injuries.
- ▶ 12/06/2014: A young lad was kicking a football at resident's cars on Windsor Close the lad was identified and spoken to.
- ▶ 16/06/2014: A brick was put through a vehicle window overnight on West Drive this has been dealt with accordingly.
- ▶ 21/06/2014: A lawnmower has been stolen from the rear garden of a property on West Drive.
- ▶ 25/06/2014: A suspicious male was asking for money for the RAF on Greenway. Police checked and the RAF Association are not due in this area until the end of the month, the male was not found in the area.
- ▶ 26/06/2014: A male was sat drinking on Scothern Lane, police gave advice and male moved on.
- ▶ 01/07/2014: A male was sat drinking on Scothern Lane, advice was given and male moved on.

29) Police Matters continued

- ▶ 04/07/2014: A mobile phone and Dictaphone were stolen from a vehicle parked on the driveway on Scothern Lane, vehicle was left unlocked, security advice was given.
- ▶ 04/07/2014: A wheelbarrow was stolen from a garden on West Drive.
- ▶ 07/07/2014: A bag containing medical items was found on Scothern Lane and handed into the Police.

■ DC Stuart Curtis reported that there appeared to be a delay on the progression of the Eastern bypass as new plans were being submitted for the non-motorised bridge on Hawthorne Road.

– 31) Reports on Matters Outstanding –

■ A) Standing Orders: The new Standing Orders had been checked over by Councillor Stuart Curtis which included additional clauses.

That the new clauses be adopted by Sudbrooke Parish Council; proposed by Councillor Bob Waller, seconded by Councillor Martin Dickie.

■ B) Tennis Court Upgrading: Further to minute 20 of the meeting of June 5, 2014 a further quotation for pressure washing had been received in the sum of £150; a revised cost of the line marking at £200; fitting of net post brackets two quotations received in the sums of £200 and £150.

The line marking, supply of tennis net and posts, supply of storage box for nets be awarded to Machine and Pitch, total £875.00.

The pressure washing of courts be awarded to Mr Peter Malone at a cost of £150.00. The fitting of the net post brackets be awarded to Mr Neil Smith at a cost of £150.00. Proposed by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Councillor Peter Heath.

■ C) Sports Day, June 29 - Update: Unfortunately this event had been rain-affected. It was agreed that prizes purchased be passed to the Village Hall for Quiz Night prizes and Pre-School for their use.

Councillor Peter Heath proposed a vote of thanks to Mike Halliday for organising the Sports events over the past years; this was seconded by Councillor Martin Dickie.

To date no one had offered to take over from Mr Halliday.

■ D) Highways - Street light, Courtfield Close: Notification had been received from Highways that a new street lighting project for Sudbrooke would be undertaken during the next financial year. This would include the street light on Courtfield Close but that it would be moved to a more suitable position.

Suggestions were outlined to the Parish Council and members were particularly interested in those which would benefit the village.

The company had agreed to write a short article for **Sudbrooke News** in order to explain their suggestions/potential for development.

b) Poachers Lane/Sudbrooke House planning applications: It was noted that the planning applications for Poachers Lane and Sudbrooke House, Church Lane would be on the agenda for the WLDC Planning Committee meeting on 23rd July 2014. Councillors Paul Rignall and Peter Heath agreed to attend on behalf of the Parish Council.

c) Planning permission:

9 Greenway - 131213 - side extension. 12 Fox Covert - TPO work - 033085.

------ 35) Chairman's Comments

Concern was expressed about the extent of growth of some residents' hedges in the village. It was agreed to mention this in **Sudbrooke News** requesting that the hedges be cut back rather than pushing residents onto the road.

----- 36) Playground Inspector ----

■ It was noted that Mr Peter Malone, Play Equipment Inspector, had undertaken a ROSPA Routine Playground Inspection Course on May 15, 2014.

——— 37) Correspondence ——

Best Kept Village Competition: The village had been successful in continuing into the next round of this competition with favourable comments from the judges.

A resident had complained about the hedge on Church Lane owned by Barber Farms being overgrown. It was understood that this had now been cut by the company contracted by the farmer/owner of the hedge.

Notification had been received about the Community Wildlife grant organised through the Lincolnshire County Council.

It was felt that a wild flower area could be seeded in the Jubilee Garden. Councillor Ian Russell would liaise with the Clerk regarding this with a view to submitting a grant application.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Brief report of meeting held on September 4, 2014

■ Police report received as follows:

17/08/2014: Alleged motorcycle in Sudbrooke woods, of which there was no trace when officers arrived.

24/08/2014: Male reported for drinking on Holme Drive, Police have spoken to the male.

■ Vandalism to play equipment at Village Hall:

Two incidents of vandalism have occurred to the log barrel down at the village hall playing field, the second being nuts and bolts removed, leaving it in a dangerous condition. Both incidents are in the hands of the Police and the area is being monitored.

The Parish Council are seeking quotations for the possible installation of cctv around the site.

■ Application for grant for wildflower seeds for Jubilee Garden through Lincolnshire County Council Community Wildlife Grant:

An application for the grant for the flowers had been prepared in the sum of £350.00 (confirmation has since been received that the grant has been awarded).

Repairs to footway outside 3 and 5 Greenway:

This area is where the bus stops and is in poor condition (Since the PC meeting the Highways Department have confirmed that repairs will be carried out).

Cleaning of the Park Gates:

The gates have a covering of algae on them and a price is being sought for their cleaning.

■ Christmas Tree event 2014:

The tree will be lit on Sunday 30 November (note for diaries) with the usual mulled wine and mince pies. Are there any offers of help from residents please?

Planting of daffodil bulbs:

The Council are purchasing daffodil bulbs for in-filling on Scothern Lane where some of those previously planted have been disturbed by works in the verge.

■ Bus shelter opposite Park Gates:

A grant has been offered by Lincolnshire County Council for the replacement of the bus shelter opposite the Park Gates. The current shelter has been there for many years and is in poor condition, currently being a tasty feast for woodworm.

Hence the Parish Council have taken up the grant - a new bus shelter is being made by Knights of Langworth and will shortly be in situ - at no cost to the parish.

SURVIVAL SKILLS

Do you remember those really heavy rain storms just as the school holidays were about to start? If so then please spare a moment to commission with the

moment to commiserate with the 100+ scouts that were trying to take part in a survival camp on the weekend of the 18-20 July.

One of the Scout Activity Badges is Survival. The aim is to learn a variety of survival techniques, then spend 24 hours using them.

On this particular weekend, such tasks building and lighting fires, and cooking on them without utensils was a daunting challenge with the lack of dry firewood being a problem.

The scouts were also taught navigation without the use of a compass. This included using stars, the sun and a shadow stick and even analogue watches. The latter requires you to point the hour hand at the sun. Bisect the angle between the hour and 12.00 (GMT).

This gives you the North-South line. Then you should be able to work out which end is North.

The Scouts also purified water, skinned and gutted rabbits and fish, identified edible plants, and learnt how to use axe, saw and knife

safely. What was to be the highlight was to learn how to build a bivouac and then build and sleep in their own one.

Unfortunately the weather turned against us. Whilst some Groups took the

early decision not to do this due to the imminent very bad weather, other persevered and did manage to build bivis. However at 2.30 on the Sunday morning the heavens opened, and did not close for the next hour.

Throughout the remainder of the night/early morning various groups of damp Scouts trotted, squelched, slid and oozed their way back to the main buildings where they were well looked after, got warm and spent the rest of the time in a communal gathering.

One group of four scouts did survive the whole night, though, and were duly praised during the closing ceremony on Sunday.

I have to admit that we were one of the groups who took the decision not to even

attempt the bivi night, but though we were dry in our tents, we did suffer from a collapsed gazebo due to the weight of water.

We are going to try again later this autumn. Wish us better weather please.

Dear Editor,

Whilst shopping in Nettleham in July, I picked up a copy of the Nettleham Neighbourhood Draft Plan and was very impressed by the detail and clarity of information and the accompanying questionnaire for residents' feedback.

Many residents of Sudbrooke are unable to attend Parish Council Meetings for a variety of reasons and may not have internet facilities.

Although the minutes appear in **Sudbrooke News**, they are inevitably out of date as they have to be ratified before publication.
Consequently, items such as the new Local Plan launched at the Lincoln Hotel on June 5 can be missed.

Moreover, important issues as: 'One new policy would be that building would be allowed outside settlement boundaries' (quote from July Issue **Sudbrooke News**) can slip under the radar. This differs from the original agreement in the Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan.

Prompted by the above, together with a letter published in the July/August Issue of **Sudbrooke News** by Peter Brown asking if any notices had been displayed regarding development in the woods, and several conversations with fellow villagers on the same subject, I decided to attended the Meeting of the Parish Council on July 10.

I asked if a similar draft plan and questionnaire could be provided for the residents of Sudbrooke and also made reference to developments in Sudbrooke Woods. I was informed that as Sudbrooke is a much smaller parish than Nettleham it would, understandably, not be economically viable to produce such a document; although I feel a questionnaire would be helpful.

I was also informed that there is only one major development proposed for Sudbrooke and that it would be within the environs of the woods.

Stuart Curtis agreed that more information should be disseminated to parishioners and said he would provide this in the next issue of **Sudbrooke News**.

This he has kindly done (September issue), although it is lacking in specific detail of dates and times for when Sudbrooke parishioners could see and comment on the proposals.

It would seem that this may be during the October Parish Council meeting.

Judging by a previous occasion when the Parish Council meeting was filled with parishioners who were concerned about what was happening to Sudbrooke Woods and footpaths, the future of the woods and environs is of great importance to the good folk of Sudbrooke.

Perhaps it would be good for more people to attend the Parish Council meetings.

the judges' expectations, but which still added to the vibrancy and all-round effort which was very much in evidence.





THE ART OF FORGIVENESS =

Towards the end of the summer I had a couple of weeks off and was able to enjoy doing what I never make enough time to do - read.

One of the books I read was called '*The Hiding Place*', by Corrie Ten Boom.

It's a powerful read, since Corrie was imprisoned by the Nazi regime for

hiding and protecting Jews, during the second world war. Her sister died in the camp, Corrie survived.

Her Christian faith sustained her throughout that period and through the rest of her life.

In the book she tells of the very poignant and moving experience of meeting one of the chief guards who kept her captive in the concentration camp.

After the war was over, she was preaching at a church service on the subject of forgiveness.

As she left the pulpit and came down to the centre of

the church, she noticed a man coming toward her with his hand extended and a smile on his face.

She recognised him as the chief guard in the concentration camp where she and her sister had been incarcerated and where her sister had died.

The guard's face was beaming in response to her preaching. "Fraulein," he said, "how grateful I am for your powerful message. To think Jesus has forgiven my sins and washed them away."

Corrie Ten Boom found herself paralysed as the guard thrust his hand out toward hers. She could not raise her hand from her side.

She writes: "Even as the vengeful thoughts boiled through me, I saw the sin of them... and yet I could do nothing about it.

"I could not feel even the slightest spark of love or charity. And so I breathed this silent

> prayer: 'Jesus, I cannot forgive him, please give me your forgiveness.'"

And with that prayer she was able to lift her hand from her side and touched the hand of the man who had persecuted her.

"From my shoulder," she writes, "along my arm and through my hand passed a current from me to him... and in that moment I discovered that it is not on our forgiveness any more than on our goodness that the world's healing depends, the world's healing depends upon God.


When our Lord tells us to love our enemies, he

gives us, along with the command to do it, the love itself"

Peter once went to Jesus and asked him how many times you have to forgive someone... the answer was simple, keep forgiving.

We often confuse forgiving with forgetting, or excusing the act that has wounded us - and sometimes we are terribly wounded.

It takes great courage to forgive, but too it is an act of God's grace worked in us and through us - so necessary in a complicated and broken world.

First impressions, it is said, are important, so what are my first impressions of the Diocese of Lincoln - after actually being here in post, as I write, all of one week?


COURT

HEALTH CROSSROADS

The more I talk to people, the more I realise there are so many misunderstandings about what we do.

I was talking to a lady called Jean the other day. She's not a client, but she's in the age range of most of our clients and like most of them she isn't... how do I put this... a thin little slip of a girl.

But do you know what she said to me? She said: "You're not getting me down at Wellbeing, dressed in a leotard."

A leotard???!!! I laughed my head off because I've never once seen a client in a leotard. But I like her very much and she's always game for a challenge (apart from doing something about her health and fitness!) so I asked her if she'd interview me for this article. Here's an extract:

Jean: So how are you different from all the other gyms?

Me: Well for a start, when I did my training course, all the other students thought that as soon as they'd finished, they'd be going on to train the England football team or similar.

But the main difference was they all thought that personal training was about "beasting" the clients till they dropped with exhaustion. And it was this that really made me form my philosophy if you like – and it was my Gran who made it all slot into place.

Jean: Your Grandma?!

Me: Yes, she sits in a chair all day and can't get up unless my Mum comes to help her. I remember thinking: "She needn't have been like this if she'd done some exercise".

Jean: So what is your philosophy then?
Me: I don't think that getting older has to be about slowing down and gradually not being able to do the things you used to.
Exercise should become part of your life

routine rather than something you do before you go on holiday or when you decide you're too fat.

Jean: Well it's something I certainly go along with...

Me: But these days gyms don't cater for older people. The instructors are all for helping the young girls or comparing their muscles with the young guys, but they just shove the older people on the treadmill, or the bike and let them get on with it. No wonder they get fed up and leave.

Jean: There's one more question I want to ask - what's all this I keep hearing about core strength?

Me: Well, the body builders would say it's so that they can get a six-pack on the stomach, but I'm not particularly concerned about that. Having a strong core brings all kinds of benefits because it's the centre of the body. For a start it improves your posture. How many older people do you see walking about with rounded shoulders? Also it improves your balance. Did you know that balance is one of the chief indicators of fitness in older people?

Jean: Is it? Do you mean to say that having a good balance will keep me out of that care home?

Me: It'll help. But one of the main things I think, is that it improves your strength and stamina especially in your back. With a strong core you're far less likely to injure your back when you're leaning into the car to lift something out of it for example.

Jean: So are you saying that core strength is the most important aspect of fitness in older people?

Families Working Together (FWT) is about supporting families to find ways of making positive changes to their lives that will help solve these problems.

Support time depends on the needs of individual families, as all are different and will need different levels of support during difficult times. This opportunity is being

offered to a limited number of families in Lincolnshire, giving them the chance to make changes they need to make.

What is a Key Worker?

Your family would have its own dedicated Key Worker who will help you shape the support you want. The Key Worker:

- Is someone for your family to spend the time you need with, someone you can really get to know and trust.
- Will co-ordinate support, arrange meetings and other activities with the different organisations as necessary.
- Will support your family to decide the best way forward and help put together a plan of action to achieve this.
- Takes time to work closely and get to know you, supporting individuals through the inevitable ups and downs of family life.
- With your agreement, will share your information with other agencies, to help them work together better.
- Will work through an assessment with you, and produce a Family Plan that will be regularly reviewed with you.

How do you know it will work?

We know it works because it has proved successful in other places around the country and there has even been a similar scheme here in Lincolnshire which has made a difference to families.

Families who have benefitted say they can clearly see the advantages of getting involved in this type of project.

How long have you lived in the village and where are you from originally?
