WLDC OUTREACH LEISURE OPPORTUNITIES

In the last edition of **Sudbrooke News**, I wrote about the possible Outreach leisure facilities.

I have been in negotiation with newlyappointed Active Communities Manager, Matthew Snee and have managed to secure Sudbrooke Ward as one of the three locations within the West Lindsey to run a six week pilot.

These sessions will be completely free of charge and if successful a full programme will be rolled out in September, which may incur a very small fee to offset the cost of overheads in the Village Halls.

The first four sessions have been confirmed; **June 8:** Walking Football, Sudbrooke Village Hall.

June 15: Chair based exercises, Scothern Village Hall.

June 22: Walking Netball, Sudbrooke Village Hall.

June 29: Boules/Boccia, Scothern Village Hall.

These initial sessions are aimed at the more senior residents, with a full programme for families/younger people (12 plus) to be arranged. Sessions should last between 45-60 minutes and will start at 10.30am. No need to book a place, just turn up wearing suitable attire.

All activities are for both men and women. I hope as many as possible can support this pilot and offer suggestions for other activities they would like provided.

BRUCE CLEWIN DOGGETT

SUSAN WILKINSON TALKS ABOUT THE SAD PASSING OF A SUDBROOKE HERO

HIS LIFE STORY

▶ Bruce Doggett, who died on 24 April 2018 at the age of 97, was one of Sudbrooke's oldest residents. He led an active life, which I thought might be of interest to readers of **Sudbrooke News**

Bruce was born on 16 February 1921, spending his first few years of on Monks Road in Lincoln.

On 25 May 1927, the Prince of Wales came to Lincoln to open the Usher Art Gallery, an event which six-year-old Bruce watched from the lawn in front of the building. In 1929, during the 'great depression', Bruce and his family moved to Donington, because his father thought he would have better prospects of pursuing his profession as master wheelwright there than in Lincoln.

At the age of 16, Bruce joined the staff of the Spalding branch of F W Woolworth & Co, remaining with that company until retirement. His career took him to Oxford, Birmingham, Grimsby, Cleethorpes, Goole, Hull, Milford Haven, and Haverfordwest, before he took up his final post as manager of the Woolworth 'superstore' in Nuneaton.

His career with Woolworth was interrupted by World War II when Bruce served in the RAF in North Africa, Egypt and Italy, as well as England.

After Bruce retired in 1981, he and his wife Irene soon decided that they wanted to return to live in Lincolnshire and they settled in Sudbrooke in 1983. Bruce and Irene enjoyed many happy years in the village, before Irene died in 1995.

In his early years as a Sudbrooke resident, Bruce joined the parish council and the Village Hall committee, becoming the first licensee of the bar there. He was appointed a life member of both the Nettleham and Lindsey Probus Clubs. For several years he was secretary of the Lincoln Collectors' Club and in later years a keen member of the Nettleham Heritage Association.

In the 1990s Bruce founded a Neighbourhood Watch group in the immediate area where he lived and took on the role of co-ordinator, a position he held until his death.

Bruce also served the wider community, being a voluntary guide at both Lincoln Cathedral and Lincoln Castle for approximately 10 years in each case. At the Castle he specialised in speaking to visitors about Lincoln's copy of the Magna Carta. Other organisations in which Bruce was involved were

the Sir Joseph Banks Society, the RAF Association and the Britain-Australia Society.

His interest in the work of both Banks and Matthew Flinders led him to undertake a camping holiday in Australia to learn more about their achievements there.

Among Bruce's other interests were music - having learned to play the violin at school, he started a small band - and cricket which he played until he turned 60.

Bruce had no known relatives and was fiercely independent. As time took its toll, he accepted assistance and support from friends and neighbours, many of whom visited him during his final illness at Lincoln County Hospital and then St Barnabas Hospice, where he died on 24 April 2018.

He is much missed by those who knew him.

THE WELCOME RETURN OF SUDBROOKE'S VILLAGE SHOP

"It is the small things that one appreciates: being able to take a walk whenever one wants, going into a shop and buying a newspaper, speaking or choosing to remain silent..."

...so said Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela upon his release from prison in 1990 after serving 27 years for conspiring to overthrow the South African state.

Okay, Mandela's plight may be a whole universe away from Sudbrooke issues, but simple things like popping down the street to the local shop has been deprived of the

residents of this village for the best part of two years until Arvind Bhutiya came to the rescue.

In this **EXCLUSIVE** feature, we meet the 38-year-old and find out exactly what made him leave his home town of Slough in order to breathe life back into the village shop and how he wants his business to thrive...

SO THE STORY BEGINS...

The village shop, or rather lack of, has been a bone of contention in Sudbrooke for around two years now, since the previous shopkeeper headed for the hills, leaving behind a squalid mess of a property, which for a short while previously had become a beacon of hope for residents until the business hit the skids, leaving villagers to venture to Nettleham, Scothern and beyond for even the most basic items, like bread, milk, sweets and newspapers.

Once upon a time, a round trip to the village park could be enlightened with a visit to the shop as eager little fingers foraged amongst the chocolate bars and penny chews, but once the bars went up on the front door and the lights went out inside, the chance for brief refeshment or even the opportunity to grab a local tome or a jar of sauce felt like a thing of the past.

And as every month flicked by, with the 'For Leasehold' sign hovering above the old entrance, it seemed like there was no hope left of the store ever being re-opened again.

But word eventually spread that the property had new owners and the shop could be re-opening and lo and behold, the sight of fitters working on the property before Easter actually confirmed the news most people in Sudbrooke had longed for.

Step forward new proprietor Arvind Bhutiya.

Not only the proud owner of the new shop, but also now the owner of the property that houses the Kokoo hairdressing

salon.

"One of my cousins, Balu, who is also a business parter of mine, has a shop at Claypole. near Newark."

Arvind told *Sudbrooke News*. "He told me that there was a property for sale, in a good-sized village with no shop.

"So we came here to have a look around. I liked the look of the village, it was nice and a good size. The location of the shop was nice, the property was nice, while it also had a car park. The property is in the centre of the village, that's why I liked it also, plus it is on a main road through the village."



The shop had lain dormant for two years, and potential buyers had been put off by the fact that only the leasehold was up for negotiation, as Arvind explains: "The previous shopkeeper was not the owner - he was just the leaseholder and rented the property from Hughes, a big construction company.

"We decided to approach them directly and

gave them an offer which they accepted and finally we got it. The guy who used to run the shop rented the property, so when he finished, the shop went back to the owners. It was initially only to let as a leasehold, not for sale.

"As it was only on the market to let, the rent was a bit too high, that's why it took around two years from when he vacated to now. A lot of people

viewed the property and I think that's why no one took the risk, but we approached the owners and purchased it outright, as well as the hairdressers. There's three units in total, one and two are my shop and three is the hairdressers. It all came as one package, so now I own everything.

"Christine (of Kokoo) is now my tenant, and she is very happy with that. She has been very good to us and helped us a lot. We didn't know anyone

...when we came here and Christine was the only person we knew and if we needed anything we could go to her."

It wasn't a straightforward venture for Arvind and it took around 12 months from buying the property to finally getting the shop open again.

"The first thing to do was to arrange a mortgage," revealed Arvind. "What was challenging is that the property had been closed for a long time, so all the services had been cancelled, there

was nothing up and running. We had to start from scratch.

"The property was quite a new build - built in 2004, I think - but there was a mess inside, because the previous guy had just left everything, but it wasn't a big issue as we just got rid of it all.

"We then hired a shop designer, who used to work for one of the big supermarkets, and he did the layout and everything. He also planned where to put the stock as well."

Did he ever get to the point where he felt he made the wrong choice by giving up his life to start this new venture in Sudbrooke?

"In the beginning, there were some reservations.

but once we opened the feedback was wonderful," former warehouse manager Arvind continued.

"When the guys were working here on the shop, lots of people were coming up to them and asking them about it, which meant that they were really interested in the shop which was great. When we opened on the first day, we had a very, very positive start with the amount of people coming in and telling us how pleased they were that the shop had re-opened."

Arvind was hoping to move his family into the village, but for the time being he is living in Lincoln, but with a view to eventually getting a house in Sudbrooke.

"We now live in Lincoln, myself, my wife and my little one," he said. "They like living up here. My initial plan was to rent a house in Sudbrooke, back in February, but there was no house to rent. So we rented a house in Lincoln instead. But if something comes up in the future for Sudbrooke, then we'll

definitely think about moving here, because it would be easier for me and my family.

"So far we are very happy. The good thing is that we are seeing plenty of new faces, customerwise, including people from Scothern and Nettleham, and it's getting better every day.

"Recently I created a Facebook page for the shop and I am member of the Sudbrooke Village Group. I have lots of followers. We'll see how it goes, but for us we have to work hard and make it work."

And is the shop proving to be very popular?

"We get a whole load of people - we have a mixture of ages coming,

schoolkids, elderly people who don't drive, professional people who work nine to five," he said.

"We sell lots of things, basic things like bread and milk. Pink gin is very popular too! We sell quite a few bottles. We put a picture of a bottle on the Facebook page and that gained us a few customers."

Arvind looks a perfect fit and we wish him well in his new venture and thank him for taking the plunge and giving us our shop back. Now it's our turn to support him.

SUDBROOKE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

OUR VILLAGE, OUR VOICE, SAFEGUARDING OUR FUTURE TOGETHER

Dear Resident.

In 2016, a group of volunteers started work on producing a Neighbourhood Plan for Sudbrooke. A detailed Survey was undertaken and a comprehensive Character Assessment was produced to identify the village's important historic and natural assets. These together with other relevant information are available on the Parish Council website (see below).

Consultation events were held to obtain residents' views on future development in Sudbrooke and issues such as the location of new housing, the environment, accessing local services, protection of open spaces and improving local facilities were raised as important topics for the Neighbourhood Plan Steering group to consider.

Based on residents' comments, A Community Vision for the future of Sudbrooke was suggested: In 20 years' time Sudbrooke will be a safe and peaceful rural community reflecting and conserving its unique historic heritage.

Sudbrooke will have a vibrant community spirit and sustainable infrastructure providing excellent services and facilities for all ages. New developments will respect the unique character of the village while meeting the needs of current and future residents.



Supported by funding from a Government Grant, the Group is now in a position to work towards a draft Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan, which should be available by the end of June. The draft plan will be available for consultation over a period of at least six weeks. Your

suggestions will be taken into account when the final version of the Neighbourhood Plan is produced for submission to West Lindsey District Council in late summer. An independent examination of the Plan will

then take place; if it is successful during this stage, a referendum will be

held in Autumn 2018.

MAY MEETING

Many thanks to Jenny and Colin Rose for inviting the Gardening Club members to their magnificent country garden.

It was a warm evening and the beautiful light showed off the garden to perfection. We may have missed the true magnificence of the Magnolia tree, but it was still holding on to a few blooms to show us its grandeur.

As we left the patio down a choice of crazy paved pathways, it was impossible not to enjoy the sea of Forget Me Not, bluebells and the promise of white starry flowers of Star of Bethlehem that had closed and gone to sleep for the evening; the Allium were pushing through a mix of perennials and will give flowers for weeks to come.

The stepping-stones across the lawn led our eye towards a large pond with a wooden bridge and plentiful marginal planting. This included the yellow buttercup flowers of tall Caltha and the pink candle flowers of Persicaria. With such a view you could easily miss the beautiful Tree Peony with its large, abundant, papery yellow flowers and the well-stocked bird feeding station.

The garden is a true haven for wildlife and there are three hedgehog houses for the current visitor to choose from. A secluded seating area by the pond is a perfect spot to admire the wiggly stems of the large Hazel Contorta and the Purple hazel; with a promise of hazelnuts, if the squirrel does not get there

first!
Beyond the pond are
apple, pear and plum trees
and a newly-dug vegetable plot
planted with potatoes. Grandson
Bertie's potatoes are already

growing strongly in his very own plot. There are plentiful raspberry canes and other fruit bushes; enough to share a few fruits with our feathered friends.

As we walk back up the other side of the garden, we pass a tree with clematis scrambling up its side and we find another productive vegetable area and a greenhouse.

There are runner beans, onions, beetroot and chard. Inside the greenhouse are very healthy looking tomato plants and large cacti that came with the house!

Behind the greenhouse is a herb garden in progress and the sunflower seeds planted for our club competition. They are off to a good start, but there is a long time to go before judging just before the Autumn Show.

Jenny and Colin have clearly worked very hard with the garden and we all thank them for sharing it with us and hosting a lovely evening.

■ TASKS FOR JUNE

After some lovely sunshine and warmth the garden has sprung into life and so have the weeds! Keep them under control by pulling them out or hoe off their tops in dry weather. Mowing the lawn weekly will keep it thick and strong and this will discourage weed in the lawn.

It is now safe to have your bedding and hanging baskets in the garden so they can grow to their full potential, without the fear of damage from frost. If you keep it watered and deadhead the flowers as they fade, then they will bloom the whole summer.

It is not too late to go shopping if you are a bit behind this year due to the soggy cold start

of the weather. Vegetables should now be growing nicely, so keep them watered in dry spells or they may bolt and flower too early due to stress and ruin your crop.

Plant salad crops in succession to keep an on-going supply through the summer and pinch out the side shoots of your tomatoes.

Once your spring flowering shrubs have finished blooming you can cut them back to keep them to a manageable size, so that flowering for next year is not effected. The most important task of the month is to take time to sit and relax in your garden and enjoy the fruits of your labour!

■ IT'S TOUGH SOMETIMES

▶ You will have heard much in the press, on the news and across social media about Mental Health Awareness, highlighted by the younger element of the Royal family, who have faced their own traumas, this has all been good news.

Good, because things hidden in the lives of many people are floating to the surface. People are more able to talk about their struggles and be received and accepted in a way that they haven't been in the past.

The attitude of 'pull yourself together' has begun to be replaced with 'maybe I need to listen to this person'. Alleluia! There is a long way to go, but never underestimate the power of acceptance to someone who is not accepting of themselves...

I am writing this in the middle of a pretty tough week and a day after I have been quite 'tetchy' with someone (for which I have apologised!). Tetchy because my barrel was full and I haven't made time to empty it.

Ministry in the church tends to be one of those things where no-one knows actually what you do most of the time, but there are

times when the things you are faced with are overwhelming and difficult and sometimes they come at you not in ones or twos, but in a barrage. Someone once gave me a great piece of advice - we all have a capacity - for some people it's a barrel, for some it's a thimble full.

Whatever the size of your capacity, when its full, you have to find a way of emptying it..... what's your way? Mine is prayer, or watching something that makes me properly laugh, or properly sing - I mean, loud, in the shower, in the car singing!!

We make many assumptions about people. Assumptions that they are okay. We rarely know what is going on in peoples' lives and what they are coping with and what causes people to 'tip over the edge'; we rarely know that depression is a thing for them and that just getting out of bed is exhausting; we never know the trauma, or the stress they are coping with.

So let's make an extra effort to be kind, patient and compassionate and to bring peace into the world of those who experience turmoil. It would be a better world if we could all do that?

A PENSIONER REMINISCES:

"She would

ear for the

spoke to a fellow villager the other day who had never used his bus pass, when I've had to battle through 65 years of what has been sometimes some very difficult years of life in order to qualify for mine, and so I'm determined to make the most of it before I 'pop my clogs'.

I'm so glad we still have the somewhat limited service that PC coaches delivers for us, and I make good use of it. I can't imagine going in to Lincoln by car, far too much trouble and expense. Mind you, I used the bus the other day, and seven people found it was standing room only, luckily I embarked at the shop while there were still seats available.

I reflect just after the war when I was about seven travelling with my older brother into the city of Leicester where I was born, by tramcar, and the conductress was my auntie.

She issued us with tickets that we didn't have to pay for, and we loved it. Sometimes, with a packed lunch, we would ride up and down all day. At the terminus the driver simply changed ends and set off from the cab at the opposite end of the tram. We sat on hard wood slatted seats. Who would stand (sit) for that today?

They didn't have bus passes in those days. If you remember conductors, you'll recall they carried a wooden block with a broad elastic band through which you inserted your hand. On the other side was a display of coloured tickets, of different values, depending on your length of journey, and were extracted from behind a sprung device like a mousetrap.

In later years they went upmarket with a battery-free machine that printed a ticket depending on the journey length, and came out by winding a handle. And my journey into Leicester by bus cost less than Ip. What would it be now by a bus crewed by two people?

In Singapore in the 60s, I would get up to Seletar camp from my house in Serangoon on



the Payar Lebar bus. It did have padded seats and the locals, before they sat down, used to beat the living daylights out of them, much to my curiosity. After a number of trips I discovered they were trying to dislodge the cockroaches out of them, which would beat a hasty retreat to the back of the bus to join the piglets and chickens stacked up there!

Our servant (Amah) would also come up from her home using the same service. She would carry nothing with her except two small silver five cent coins, one placed in each ear, to allow for the return journey. At the stop where she alighted, she would pause for a brew of local kopi (coffee). Served by a little Indian man from his bike,

it came in a glass, stirred up with sweet condensed milk. I recall he had skinny little legs like sticks of rhubarb coming out of a brown paper bag, with flip flops at the bottom. He would remain there all day hoping for that rush of customers that never happened.

Often in the evening I would return on the 'cockroach run' to get a takeaway curry from an eating place at Jalan Kayu, a village near to the camp. 'Pop' would serve it in a washed-out tin can previously used for other food, with a piece of string passed through two drilled holes to enable it to be carried. The rice was wrapped in a banana leaf, and tied up as a parcel with a

length of raffia, and came with a few slices of cucumber to cool the curry down. Oh happy days!

I'm writing this today from the beautiful county of Cornwall, during a visit to my eldest daughter. She runs a business called Marazion Coastal Cottages, and we try to come down a couple of times a year. Currently no passports are required, though you might think that you're in a foreign land. The Cornish language is seeing something of a revival and the natives appear a little odd sometimes, but are generally quite friendly.

One favourite spot for us is Cadgwith Cove on the Lizard. Local fishermen are prone to gather on a summers evening to recount tales of the sea, and spend the time singing sea shanties. Lovely to hear them, and to partake of fresh crab sandwiches and a glass of cider.

Looking straight past the boats pulled up on the beach, I take my usual spot on a plank of wood straddled across a couple of logs and take it all in. One year I got talking to a Birmingham couple, and we left them there enjoying the ambience, on the aforementioned seat. The following year we returned to this lovely spot, and who should we sit next to, but the same couple! I presume they had been home at some point in time.

Many visitors head for St Ives for a day out, though I'm not so sure about that place. You can't park the car anywhere near there, and it's just a short journey on the bus from Marazion, the bus pass covers it, so why not?

Fore Street is the place where the wife heads to, wall to wall shops, which you can't possibly get into. I make my way to the foreshore on Wharf St, and settle down on the nearest bench, of which the town council have installed a great many facing the sea.

This day I got talking to a lady on the next seat, who was asking what kind of bird was hopping around in front of us. Wishing to give her the benefit of my ornithological knowledge, I exclaimed it was a 'dicky bird'.

She turned to her friend and extending a thumb in my direction, said "this gentleman says it's a 'dicky bird'. I had to beat a retreat quickly before she cottoned on! Finally the wife turns up and we go back to Marazion.

Thanks to the very kind donations of plants we raised an amazing £537.65 including some sold after the day.


This was an incredible amount compared to last year's sales of £329. It was nice that so many people stopped to chat and of course thanks to those who helped on the day.

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



