bodies for consultation and comments for a period of six weeks.


This document is based on residents' views on future development in Sudbrooke covering issues such as the location of new housing, the environment, accessing local services, protection of open spaces and improving local facilities.

## Minutes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 5 July in the Sudbrooke Village Hall.

#### **57 PARISHIONERS' ITEMS**

- A resident attending the meeting drew attention to the grass encroachment on the footpaths along Wragby Road and Scothern Lane near to the Millennium Stone/Jubilee Garden. He offered to arrange to cut back the grass with a community group of which he was a member. It was noted that the group carried their own public liability insurance.
- An enquiry had been received about allotments in Sudbrooke to which the Clerk had replied.
- ▶ A report had been received of the overgrown grass verges adjoining the cycle path between Sudbrooke and Scothern. The resident had been advised to contact LCC and County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins.
- Concern from a resident that potholes had not been filled in while works to Church Lane were being carried out. The resident had been advised that the works being carried out were to the footway and not the highway.
- A report received of further dumping of waste on Main Drive it was noted that Environmental Health, WLDC were dealing with this.
- Report of building site traffic using Manor Drive and West Drive for access. This was discussed by the Parish Council

- and considered a breach of the traffic management plan. Clerk to write to LCC Highways and a meeting to be arranged with developers.
- ▶ A resident had drawn attention to the trees surrounding the Village Hall playing field and requested that careful consideration be given to their future maintenance.

#### ■ 61 POLICE MATTERS

a) Incidents for May/June 2018 Sudbrooke - supplied by PCSO J Parker:
 May 5: Wragby Road - Other Offences Two men throwing rocks at passing vehicles.

May 5: Wragby Road - Two males walking in the road trying to hitch a lift.

May 5: Wragby Road - Male in owner's garden - ran off leaving a rucksack behind. Two males arrested.

May 20: Wragby Road - Abandoned Call - Silent 999 call.

May 25: Wragby Road - RTC Damage only - Two vehicle RTC.

June 10: Wragby road - RTC Injury - Two vehicle road traffic collision - ambulance request.

b) Neighbourhood Watch: Confirmation had been received that new Neighbourhood Watch signs would be supplied. It was hoped that more co-ordinators could be recruited. PCSO Parker would write an article for the Sudbrooke News.

## ■ 62 COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

- CC Sue Rawlins reported as follows:
- That LCC Highways would be cutting the cycle path between Sudbrooke and Scothern week commencing August 20.
- She was pursuing the cutting back of the severely overhanging hedge on St Edward's Drive.

• That she was encouraged that many of the potholes in the county had now been filled in.

## ■ 63 DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

- ▶ Bob Waller reported as follows:
- A Healthy Homes Grant of up to £5,000 is available to address issues such as damp, mould excess cold and reduce falls on stairs etc. This aims to improve the property standards of vulnerable people who own their own home and whose property standard is affecting their health.
- That the Outreach Leisure Programme take-up had been good. The scheme had involved several sports for senior residents and it was now hoped that this would be carried on from September.

## ■ 64 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

a) Village Sign: Messrs Truelove Property felt that they had taken the matter of siting the village sign as far as they could with LCC Highways, but stated that the offer to erect the sign on Parish Council land still stood. Members considered LCC Highways had continued to create obstructions for the siting of the sign on Highways land and unanimously Resolved that the Chief Executive of Lincolnshire County Council be advised. An alternative location for the siting of the sign was considered. That the sign be sited on the Jubilee Garden proposed by Councillor Peter Heath. seconded by Councillor Paul Rignall and following a vote unanimously Resolved.

#### **JULY 2018**

#### ■ 65 HIGHWAY MATTERS

Notification of temporary closure of Public Right of Way (PROW) 160 (Between Fox Covert Link Footway & PROW 158), Public Right of Way (PROW) 817 (Between RPOW 160 and a point 80 metres West) or Footpath between Fox Covert and Main Drive Members felt further clarification of this closure was required from the developer. Unanimously Resolved that a site meeting be requested with the Site Manager.

## ■ 66 CONDITION OF PLAY AREA, NORTHFIELD PARK

Decouncillor Mrs Gina Thompson produced photographs of areas in the play area that she felt required attention, particularly the moss growing on the felt surface. It was noted that the annual equipment inspection carried out by RoSPA was due in August. In the meantime the Play Equipment Inspector would be asked to try to remove some of the moss.

## ■ 67 CONDITION OF BENCHES IN VILLAGE

Councillor Paul Rignall had submitted a report of the benches in the village which he considered required attention:

 Bench 1, junction of Scothern Lane and the A158 requires a coat of preservative.
 Bench 2, Park gates, has a slat missing.
 This bench is painted green so a good rub

down and painting.

Bench 3, Northfield Park play area, needs a coat of preservative.

■ Bench 4, Village hall car park. Leg split.
■ Bench 5, outside the Village Hall on Scothern Lane. The bottom of the legs appear rotten and flaking away.
Following discussion, Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge and Mr Dave Etheridge would refurbish these seats.

Rench 3 - the Clerk to arrange with the

Bench 3 - the Clerk to arrange with the Play Equipment Inspector to refurbish this.

Bench 3 and 4 to be replaced with seats made from none-rotting, recycled material. Prices to be obtained.

## ■ 68 SUDBROOKE TENNIS COURT - PROPOSALS FOR ADDITIONAL USE

▶ Following proposals and a discussion with two local residents, it was unanimously Resolved that the Multi Purpose Sports Area (Tennis Court) be used for football as a community project, known as Sudbrooke Community Court project, currently at no hiring charge, but to be reviewed in 12 months.

The following was noted and would be conveyed to the Project organisers:
The area will be swept prior to marking out for football. However, it is a requirement of the Parish Council insurance that it is kept free of debris and leaves. As there will be no hiring charge, the Parish Council require that as part of the Project organiser's Risk Assessment, and prior to use, the condition of the surface be assessed and if required removal of any debris by sweeping. The Parish Council insurance public liability cover does not

extend to use of the MPSA by the Community Project and any injury or damage caused to users is not covered under the terms of the Parish Council insurance. The Parish Council have no objections to an appraisal being carried out on the flood lights by a qualified electrician.

## ■ 69 SPORTS EVENT - SATURDAY 8th SEPTEMBER 2018

▶ To consider and approve Risk Assessment - This had been circulated to all members. ClIr Paul Rignall would be First Aider. Unanimously Resolved that the Risk Assessment be approved.

## ■ 70 TO DEVELOP A POLICY FOR THE SUSTAINABILITY OF THE 'SUDBROOKE NEWS'

- ▶ The Internal Auditor had drawn attention to the cost of the production of the village magazine which was increasing annually. Whilst acknowledging the efforts of the Editor in seeking advertising to offset some of the production costs it was noted that many of the adverts not bringing in revenue were from outside organisations or other villages. Following careful consideration the following Policy was devised:
- 1. Business advertisers to be charged at current advertising rate.
- 2. Doctors Surgeries/Medical Practices to

be charged at current advertising rate.
3. Clubs/Societies/Charities not within Sudbrooke parish to be charged 50 per cent of current advertising rate.
Unanimously Resolved that the above Policy be adopted.

#### ■ 71 CHRISTMAS TREE EVENT

▶ The Christmas tree switch would take place on November 25, 2018. An offer had been received from the Village Hall fund raising committee to take over the event.

As the Parish Council's aim in the event was to raise funds for the provision of the Christmas tree it was considered that the PC should continue to hold an event at the tree, sell mulled wine and apply for a temporary events licence. Councillor Paul Rignall would obtain further information regarding the licence.

Lloyds Bank were able to offer similar facilities to Co-op. That the Parish Council change bankers to Lloyds Bank and that all members be signatories unanimously Resolved.

#### ■ 73 PLANNING MATTERS

a) Park developmentt - Anything further to report: The Clerk was asked to arrange a site meeting for the Parish Council with the Site Manager and Landscape Architect.
 b) Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan: It was reported that good progress was being made on the Plan.

The Professional Services Contract for Carroll Planning and Design for preparation of a map denoting local green spaces, green corridor and non-designated heritage assets within the Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan Area had been received at a cost of £240.00. This cost had been included in the grant application of which funds had been received. Unanimously Resolved that Councillor Peter Heath, Parish Council Chairman, sign the Contract in order for the Plan to proceed further.

- ▶ c) Planning application 137883 -3 Holme Drive, First Floor extension: Comments forwarded to WLDC - No objections by Parish Council.
- d) Transfer of Land, East of Scothern

Lane: Letter received from Parish Council Solicitors stating that due to the protracted nature of the correspondence their cost estimate of £500 had been exceeded and that a further cost estimate had been issued to the solicitors acting on behalf of the developers Solicitor.

Unanimously Resolved that a request be made to the developers requesting a further undertaking in respect of additional cost.

- D Sudbrooke Draft Neighbourhood Plan: This was presented to the Council for approval prior to the six week public consultation period September 22-November 3, 2018 open days for residents to attend being 9th and 11th October. The Chairman expressed thanks to Mrs Barbara Bingham and the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group for all the efforts put into producing the Plan. Members unanimously Resolved that the draft plan be approved and it be sent out to Consultees.
- ▶ Request to site clothing bank on Village Hall Car Park: This was considered and felt that the Village Hall site was not the appropriate place for a clothing bank, being that it is on the edge of the village where it would not be possible to police it and it would take up valuable space on the car park.
- Cutting of Sudbrooke Road footpath: The Parish Council will be sharing the cost

- with Scothern Parish Council of cutting the footway verges on Sudbrooke Road between the two villages, making it more walkable for residents and those using it for walking to school.

#### AN OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE YOUR SAY - WEST LINDSEY COUNCIL BUDGET

I hope that you are all fit and well as you read this article and hopefully enjoying the late "Indian summer" conditions.

For many years I have always accepted my council tax and paid the required amount. I never really investigated where or how my money was being spent.

It was the same when the Parish Council published their precept. But now as a District Councillor and Vice Chair of Sudbrooke Parish Council, I am more heavily involved, and now you are able to have your say.

West Lindsey District Council is seeking the views of residents on its budget for the next financial year.

Residents can take part on our online budget tool or they are invited to attend one of two events in the district. The events will give people a chance to understand the current situation and to give their views on how this affects the community.

Views are being sought on the following:

**M** Council tax level

The council is also asking people how the New Homes Bonus government grant will be utilised in West Lindsey.

Options include: providing an allocation based on the number of new properties in a parish, an allocation through a communities grant finding scheme, or use all the new homes bonus to support growth and regeneration across the district.

Cllr Jeff Summers, Leader of West Lindsey District Council said: "Each year we ask local people their views on what we as a council should priorities in terms of our spending.

"This valuable feedback is crucial in helping us to set the budget for the next financial year.

"It is no secret that West Lindsey District Council has seen a reduction of £4.4million in our Revenue Support Grants since 2013/14.

"I believe the council has managed this reduction in our finances very well, but it is going to get much harder to do this, as we are expecting to get £0 grant in 2019/20 and beyond.

"Times are challenging for local government. With reduced budgets from central government, it is critical that we direct our resources in a way that benefits our communities, and meets their needs and priorities."

#### TASKS FOR OCTOBER

Autumn is definitely approaching and it's a beautiful time of year with the trees and shrubs changing colour. The RHS top jobs for



the month include:

- dividing established rhubarb crowns to create new plants
- cutting back perennials which have died down
- dividing herbaceous perennials
- moving tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory
- planting out spring cabbages
- harvesting your apples and pears
- pruning climbing roses

NOTHER Armed Forces day has come and gone with the passing of summer; to many it has little meaning, but there are a few of us to whom our days serving in the military allow us to be come overtaken with nostalgia.

The YMCA activity centre on Tritton Road

was the venue for a free breakfast served to any veterans who turned up, by a group of enthusiastic young people.

An opportunity to chat with others of like mind while eating eggs and bacon. I sat next to another ex-RAF guy who had served with me out in the Far East in the 6os.

Now in a wheelchair, he had many interesting stories to tell as a 'snowdrop' (so called because they wore white tops on their RAF caps).

On these occasions there is often much inter-

service merriment as we take the Mick out of the other services. The cartoon by Tez on this page sort of sums it up.

After the breakfast I caught a bus into town, and wandered up the High Street to view some of the military displays in the Cornhill and City Square.

I did enquire at the RAF recruiting area if they could still use a radio technician who was an expert in Vulcan communications, but they declared I was probably too old, and anyway the Vulcans were now obsolete.

Someone politely suggested if I was looking for a job they might take me on as a volunteer on the Lancaster being rebuilt at East Kirkby, as that was more my era. The cheek!

We had a great talk about that aircraft at the

Village Hall on July 20th by a very enthusiastic lady, hoping to get it to fly again. Hope you didn't miss it.

It was time to sit down again, I do enjoy the seat on Lincoln High Bridge, from where you get a good view of any action taking place.

There's always someone who is prepared to join you! This time it was a volunteer collecting for RAFA, and he also needed a rest.

We chatted about our service days, and found we had much in common, when the

old chap next to us seemed as though he couldn't contain himself any longer, threw his arms round us and thanked us for our service to the country. Had we been in France we might have even got a peck on each cheek.

A very nice gesture indeed, and a well-meaning handshake. I must say (if I ever came across one) I should do the same to a police officer. They take so much stick sometimes, the occasional thank you from a member of the

public would probably not go amiss, and make their day a bit more tolerable.

Before my colleague and I parted, a little girl came up to ask if she could take a picture of us in front of the RAF 100 celebration sign, and having been poked in the ribs by her dad, sought an explanation for the medals we were wearing.

Didn't take long for me, but I excused myself as my newly-found friend, who had a row of them, was still explaining his, to to the awestruck seven-year-old.

In the street where I grew up,
Birstall in Leicestershire, we had
very few men who were called up to
fight in World War Two. In fact
only Wally next door was, and he
was in the navy. I never met him till
he came home in 1946. He walked
up the street with his 'bell bottom'
trousers flapping, kit bag over his
shoulder, to a huge amount of applause from

all the neighbours.

I remember coming home from school one day in 1945 and read on a poster in the street that the war had ended. I understood what that meant, and rushed home to tell my mum, but surprising enough she seemed to know already!

The following year we had a big party in the street and I still have that photo. There wasn't too much on the tables though, with food rationing still in force, but the novelty of eating out in the street was so much fun. We probably

had fish paste sandwiches, or corned beef, and home made jelly, blancmange, and covered in evaporated milk (the jelly). Lemonade would have chased it down.

Not long after the war was finished, the next street was, on occasion, occupied by prisoners of war carrying out maintainance to the road surface. They had big POW signs on their overalls and guarded by an overseer, but we were never allowed to get near them. Didn't

stop us kids finding a way to hurl verbal abuse at them though!

How unfair, all they wanted to do was go home at that point, but we were just mouthing what our parents were saying in the house.

War, and its misery were still fresh in their minds. I do also remember watching tanks trundling up the A6 through the village, on some days after school was over.

Presumably off to be decommissioned somewhere. They were mostly occupied by Americans. We'd never seen an American before, and would stare open mouthed at the black ones, having only seen them in Tarzan films at the matinee in the local cinema (Bert Pollard's flea pit).

We caught on that if you shouted "got any gum chum", they might just throw you a stick of something called chewing gum, stuff that you could chew on, but never diminished in size!

How about that!

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

#### ■ FRANTIC TERM TIME SCHEDULE

▶ I am writing this in the second week of the school term. Its 'back to routine' for many - I guess that for some it will be a huge relief and for others it will not! The demands on my time definitely rise during term time and to be honest, as a former teacher, I still work in school terms. I always get that 'end of term' feeling and the 'beginning of term' nerves!!

The last couple of weeks have been 'full on' - back to long days after the relative steady pace of August, so this morning I was pleased to read these words in Psalm 46 .... (Psalms are simply songs, or poems)

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in times of trouble"

That psalm ends with:

"Be still and know that I am God"
I then read the following written by Paul
Graystone:

"In times of distress, we try to trust God, but it's so difficult when we can't actually see him intervening...... but this is a psalm to return to repeatedly as our lives and our world pass through crises, which then become history. It speaks of how God who sustained us in the past is the same God who will not let us down in the present.

We've flooded the bathroom and the world did not end, and neither did our faith. We've fallen disastrously in love with all the wrong people, and we are still alive - and so is Jesus.

We've lost our jobs and our car keys and our health and our tempers, and God is still bearing us up. Our doubts and our fears are not at an end. But we can overcome difficulties because of the absolute commitment of God to be with us - an with that in mind we need to be still and take a moment to know that the Lord is God."

So, for some I guess, that is a bridge too far, because even believing that there is a God is a fanciful idea.... But just to encourage you .... If we live life at top speed all the time, eventually we run out of control - stopping and reflecting is really important for our wellbeing, whether we bring God into that or not. .. and somehow we need to anchor our lives and root them into something solid, something that will ground us.

Today I took a step back. Its been bonkers, so I went to the coast - it took an hour of walking on the beach to draw breath - and get perspective ..... so do find your 'beach' even if its five minutes sitting on the loo away from the madness!!
