

The Chairman extended thanks to five volunteers who had cleared debris, trimmed back shrubs and planted snowdrops, in the garden making a noticeable improvement to the area.

#### ■ 186 HIGHWAY WORKS. CHURCH LN

a) Church Lane works: CC Mrs Sue Rawlins stated that she had spoken to the LCC Highways Officer regarding the works required on this Lane and AW had stated they would reinstate the verges in drier conditions.

Concern was expressed about the damage caused to the road surface by machinery used during the works last year. CC Rawlins would arrange a site meeting with the Highways Officer and a representative from Anglian Water.

- b) Overgrown area, junction of Scothern Lane/Holme Drive: This area was considered to be causing a restricting view to traffic and members felt that a working party could be organised to clear back some of the area.

#### ■ 190 PLANNING MATTERS

■ a) Sudbrooke Park development - report on meeting with developers: Councillors Peter Heath, Bob Waller and Ian Russell had met with representatives of the Brief report as follows...

**Access**: It is planned to still use West drive for inbound traffic, but exiting site traffic will use the farm roads round onto the A158. Articulated trucks will enter and exit via the farm roads. A daily schedule will be published to show traffic coming to the site and that access will be coordinated to avoid entry and exit conflictions involving articulated vehicles.

The farm access roads are only single track and therefore unable to accept normal traffic flow. This means that large vehicles carrying aggregate and other materials will be using West Drive. The developers were asked to reconsider and to see if it is possible to use the track alongside the scout camp for entry or exit. **Development**: The first phase should commence in mid-March, with the delivery of equipment to start laying the support networks of roads and services. The equipment will be kept on site and workers are to be brought in by two transit vans each day.

Phase 1 is the development of the land bounded by Holme Drive extension, Main Drive and West Drive they estimate it will take about 18 months. They will also develop the land where the pub will stand as their Marketing Suite accessed from Holme Drive. The site office will be to the south of West Drive by the bridge over the stream.

**Low cost Housing**: They have come to an agreement with WLDC, but the format is not clear. They are providing 25 per cent of the housing as low cost, but have not designated which they will be, nor have they a process as yet for the public to express an interest.

They have yet to sign an agreement with group for that purpose.

**Landscaping**: The current ponds will be de-silted and partly cleared as part of Phase 1.

There are still trees to be removed, but will not be done until the next newt collection time has been and gone (next autumn). There is scope for different nesting boxes to be installed and house holders will be invited to have swift boxes on their houses.

**Snow Drops**: Permission was given for the removal of some snowdrops for planting in the Jubilee Garden and to a 'safe' haven where they could flourish and hopefully be replanted in the development when it is completed.

Concern was expressed that as the roads in Sudbrooke were currently being re-surfaced, the additional heavy traffic may cause damage. Resolved that photographs be taken of the condition of the roads and copied to the developers prior to commencement.

▶ b) Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan: The application form for grant was nearing completion and this would be submitted as soon as possible.

# ■ APPROVAL OF THE NOTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON APRIL 6, 2017 TO BE SIGNED AS MINUTES

▶ Proposed by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Councillor Andy Cottam that the notes were a true record of the meeting and that they be signed as minutes.

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

This year has been another busy year for the Parish Council. We were all devastated when Stuart Curtis lost his battle with cancer; he is sadly missed for his knowledge and good humour and drive to support this village. Continuity with the Parish Council has been maintained by the election of our Deputy Chairman Bob Waller to the vacant District Council seat.

We have continued to liaise with Jackson and Jackson, the developer of The Parklands, to ensure the impact on the existing village is minimised and that the development complements our community.

Work has commenced on clearance of the site for the first phase of the development and your Council has had some influence in the retention of natural parkland surrounding the development. Our annual Sports Day was a great success as it combined with a Village Fete run by the Village Hall Committee and it is hoped to achieve the same success this year.

Our decision to combine our Christmas tree event with the Village Hall was taken on practical grounds, but was not the success of previous years. It has been resolved to restore the event to the tree and provide refreshments and encourage parishioners to attend the Village Hall after the switch on.

The Tennis Court at the Village Hall received a make-over courtesy of a community youth group and is available to parishioners for tennis or five-a-side football.

Though we still have some vandalism with damage to the fence, overall it has been reduced with the installation of a working CCTV system.

The generation of the Neighbourhood plan has been slow. The responsibility for the plan fell on a few of our parishioners and proved a difficult task, but the bulk of the work has now been done.

We have applied for further funding and secured the service of a consultant to draw the final strings together.

We plan to present it to you and hold a referendum on its adoption later this year.

#### ■ 191 CLERK'S REPORT

A busy year for an active Parish Council, again a dominant item being the development in Sudbrooke Park.

It is hoped that the Parish Council will soon have ownership of the new sports field on Scothern Lane and it will be named in memory of Councillor Stuart Curtis, who sadly passed away last October.

Members, the Treasurer and myself have attended training courses during the year run by the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils. These are very useful and assist in keeping us updated on new legislation.

Training and information is ongoing regarding the new General Data Protection Regulations that will come into force at the end of May 2018.

There are concerns about the burdens the new Data Protection regulations will place on councils and how this will undoubtedly impact, eventually on council tax payers with the necessity for Councils to appoint a Data Protection Officer.

Last year I reported it was hoped that Sudbrooke would have funding made available from LCC for improvements to the road surfaces in the village. Well it has happened and smartened up the village. I couldn't count how many reports I have made to LCC about potholes over the last few years.

Sudbrooke is very fortunate to have a hard working team of parish councillors working for it.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

The Council received a Precept (budget) of £26,626.00.

During the year the Council spent £6,800 on grass cutting – it was the first year that the County Council didn't make a large contribution to the costs. Their contribution this year was £438 meaning that the Parish Council have paid just over £6,300.

We spent £2,300 on printing and preparing the **Sudbrooke News** this year with advertising revenue generated of £471. The Council recognise that the **Sudbrooke News** is an essential part of our community and will continue to support it financially.

A full copy of the accounts will be available to members of the public in due course as per instructions from the Auditors.

The Council lived within its budgeted precept.

# ■ COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT – SUE RAWLINS, WELTON RURAL DIVISION

▶ The County Council year of 2017/18 has continued to be a financially challenging one; an ongoing trend in the public sector nationally and particularly for Shire counties as evidenced by recent news coverage regarding the strains on local government funding, particularly around adult social care.

In developing its two-year local financial plan to take the authority to the end of the four-year funding deal from government, the Council has increased the Council Tax for 2018/19 by 2.95 per cent in addition to the adult care premium of two per cent.

At the July 2017 County Council meeting, the authority launched a campaign to lobby government to increase the level of funding to the sector and to specifically request that central government look at the distribution of funding to the Council to reflect the needs of the area. In the meanwhile, the Council prudently maintains a financial volatility reserve.

The Council still has difficulties with IT elements of the "Serco" contract, which it is working with the company to ensure that they provide services in accordance with the commercial terms agreed and deliver all outstanding transformation work

A new contractor, Galliford Try, has been brought in to ensure that progress continues on the Lincoln Eastern By-pass after the Council officially ended its contract with Carrillion. Galliford Try will keep things moving in the immediate future while the council finds a long-term replacement. It is hoped a new company will take over in the summer.

Planning permission has been granted for the construction of a 60-metre diameter roundabout with associated realignment and improvement works to the existing A46 Dunholme/Welton junction. An extended period of time to seven years to implement the scheme was recommended due to the complexities of funding and land assembly.

# ■ DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT 2018 - COUNCILLOR BOB WALLER

▶ I would like to start this report by paying a tribute to my predecessor, the late Stuart Curtis. Stuart did a tremendous amount for the villages of Scothern and Sudbrooke during his time as the District Councillor for Sudbrooke Ward and as a member of Sudbrooke Parish Council. He is deeply missed by all his friends and colleagues.

Since being elected in November 2017, I have attended a training and update sessions that have made me confident in being able to fulfil my role, especially as a member of the WLDC Planning Committee. I will strive to serve the residents of Sudbrooke Ward to the best of my ability.

During this Civic Year, the Council has undergone a major management restructure that has made the council more efficient, but also has resulted in a

considerable reduction in cost. The Council has also invested some of its reserves into initiatives that not only produces revenues, but also helps to create employment opportunities within West Lindsey.

In April of last year, the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan for the next 25 years was formally adopted. This plan with its policies for growth and regeneration will make sure that our settlements grow in the right way, ensure we have homes and employment where we need them and ensure our new communities are sustainable, accessible and inclusive.

On March 5, the Budget and Corporate Plan for 2018 was approved at full Council. This included a three per cent rise in Council Tax, one of the lowest increases across the country.

This was achieved through streamlining

systems and prudent investments in revenue streams against a backdrop of central Government reduced funding.

The "Green Bin" garden waste scheme introduced in March is proving to be a success with 82.8 per cent of the target being met by mid-March.

While some residents argue that it should be a service paid for through council tax,

garden waste disposal is a discretional service that the Council do not have to provide.

By making it an opt in service, only people using the scheme pay for It, not all Council Tax payers. WLDC is the last council in the county to charge for such a service.

# ■ POLICE - OVERVIEW OF POLICING IN LINCOLNSHIRE

▶ The Chief Constable is confident that in 2018-19 we will be able to reach the figure of 1100 officers for policing in this county.

He hopes this demonstrates his commitment to frontline resourcing, even when the budget is limited.

Lincolnshire Police will continue to campaign, petition, discuss, and demonstrate what we do and how we do it, and quite simply how safer and better funding could help us in Lincolnshire.

In Lincolnshire, we have a workforce that is made up of dedicated, passionate

people who carry out exceptional work on a daily basis, and that has been with a backdrop of an uncertain financial future for some time - that is no mean feat.

# ■ SUDBROOKE LADIES' CLUB: Gill Rignall

# ■ SUDBOOKE VILLAGE HALL: Allan McCrone

▶ The Village Hall was opened in 1986 as a meeting place and community asset for both the village and the wider community and is operated under the rules and regulations of the Charity Commission Registration number 504143.

The Hall is maintained and run by a Management Committee of seven trustees and representatives of various groups who regularly use the hall - the principals being a Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Booking Secretary and Bar Manager.

This committee meets every six weeks over the year to ensure the proper management of the hall's business, to ensure that our constitution is followed and to see that the audited accounts are presented to the Charity Commission at the appropriate time.

The past year has sadly been overshadowed by the death of Stuart Curtis. Stuart was one of the founders of Sudbrooke Village Hall and had been a trustee and an active committee member since its inception. His last role was as Booking Secretary and his contribution to both the Village Hall and the wider village community will be sorely missed.

During the last year. the hall has continued to be well used on a regular basis by the Pre-School, Seniors Coffee Club, Ladies' Club, Whist Club, Gardening Club, Mahjong, Pilates, Kick Boxing and the Parish Council, together with many ad hoc bookings such as children's and birthday parties, family get togethers, religious meetings and theatre rehearsals.

Our financial position is in good shape due to the hard work of our fund raising team, particularly with the contribution of the monthly quiz nights run by Bob Waller and the sterling efforts of our licensee, Paul Rignall.

To maintain the financial stability we have had to increase some of the letting fees taking effect from January 1, 2018. Our overall finances are under the

professional control of our Treasurer, Hugh Thomson, who I would personally like to thank for keeping us on the straight and narrow.

Over the past year we have almost completed the upgrading of the Village Hall to comply with Regulatory Fire Safety Act of 2015. A new pressure pad fire safety door has been fitted to the kitchen exit, tamper proof fire exit alarms have been fitted to the Main Hall and Bramham Lounge emergency doors and a lockable fire safety box to contain the relevant log books and certification has been located in the kitchen area.

We have created a new post on the Committee - that of Fire and Safety representative. Amy Jackson has agreed to take on this role and is currently conducting a monthly check as per the fire and safety manual.

The general maintenance is always an ongoing commitment throughout the year, toilets, internal lighting, sewers and wifi have all needed attention.

The role of Booking Secretary has now been filled by David Stewart who kindly offered to take on the job.

We are now looking for two trustees for the Hall.

On behalf of the committee, I would like to thank Bob Waller for all his hard

work over the past few years, particularly with his fund raising activities. Bob has agreed to carry on hosting the quiz nights which are always a good source of income.



#### WLDC NEW LEISURE CONTRACT

West Lindsey District Council has revealed ambitious plans to transform and enhance leisure provision across the whole of the district. So how does it affect Sudbrooke and Scothern?

Exciting plans include the build of a brand new dry leisure facility in Market Rasen and a large scale re-development of the current West Lindsey Leisure Centre in Gainsborough.

This has meant the bowls club and other organisations will be relocated, but not closed. This means that the larger hall will be

available for more activities for more people in the district

On top of this the council has secured extra provision for an outreach service which will provide activities for residents in their community. I think that

this is good news and perhaps overdue. When the contract comes into force next month we will know exactly what activities are on offer and providing that the village halls have the capacity to allocate and infrastructure to support these facilities, we will have activities to encourage a healthy life style to enjoy on our doorsteps.

Cllr Sheila Bibb, Chairman of the Prosperous Communities Committee at the council said: "Previously, leisure provision has cost the council a significant amount of money. Under the new arrangements - not only will the

service be transformed and enhanced, but the income provided will ease the pressure on other council services.

"This dynamic partnership will provide suitable services to the community to help people lead healthy and active lives. It will include more opportunities for rehabilitation. exercise on referral and specialist equipment for different ages. I'm looking forward to seeing the results."

To transform the services. £7.8 million of funding will be used to improve leisure facilities and activity across the district. This is

# THAT'S THE WEMBLEY WAY TO DOMENTE

### VILLAGERS OUT IN FORCE WITH 30,000 OTHER LINCOLN CITY SUPPORTERS TO WATCH DANNY COWLEY'S MEN RULE AT THE NATIONAL STADIUM

s a Lincoln City fan for more years than I care to remember, watching The Imps not only run out at Wembley (along with several other Sudbrooke residents), but actually winning a final and lift a trophy in front of nearly 30,000 Imps fans was something I never thought I'd see happen.

I was there at the Millennium Stadium in the early 2000s, when City lost play-off finals to Bournemouth and Southend, but heading to the home of English football to witness the Imps triumph on the biggest stage of all was something else.

This beat watching Lincoln on a rainsodden terrace at some god-forbidden place in the middle of nowhere - Stafford Rangers springs to mind in the 1990s, when seemed like the stuff of fantasy. myself and a couple of mates journeyed to the midlands to see the Imps dumped out of the FA Cup in horrible fashion and also narrowly avoid a good kicking by a group of Stoke City hardnuts, who had gone along to support their local minnows.

Then there were away trips to the likes of Rochdale, Scarborough, Darlington, Gillingham, Wycombe, Leyton Orient, Stockport and even Gateshead and North Ferriby, which were accompanied by various degrees of success and failure, but now it was the time for the biggest of the lot. Wemblev.

As my excited son and I boarded the tube at Watford, the dawning reality of a magnificent new episode, slowly crept up on us as we headed past the famous Wembley arch and on to Baker Street station. Yes, PAST Wembley Park.

You see, Wembley Park station is not actually under the ground, but Baker Street is, and we had to venture two stops past our destination in order to experience the proper darkness of the tube.

Seeing as the Imps emerged victorious and given how superstitious us football supporters are, we'll be paying Baker Street another visit should Danny Cowley's men qualify for the League Two play-off

final in a few weeks' time. After getting drenched on the way up Wembley Way, we headed for our seats early, up THREE escalators to the top tier, almost adjacent to the halfway line.

It's funny how many people you bump into back home on these occasions, with the same ex-neighbour met, having bumped into him on Finsbury Park station following the Arsenal FA Cup quarter-final last season, while my son spotted one of his best friends outside the ground and both were filled with much excitement.

As we emerged from the concourse into the seating area, the enormity of the stadium hit home - it really is a massive arena and to be here watching Lincoln

After sitting through a girls' game and then watching the warm-ups, kick-off eventually came, and City were lucky not be down to 10 men inside the first few minutes when striker Matt Rhead avoided an early red card - looking at the incident afterwards, he forearmed smashed the Town goalkeeper and he should have been off. If the referee hadn't 'bottled' it, one wonders how the game would have eventually panned out.

City used their get-out-of-jail card to their advantage, with Elliott Whitehouse pouncing from close range to drill home the opener and put Lincoln on their way.

Shrewsbury were denied a goal by a wonderful Danny Allsopp save, but if truth be known. Lincoln saw out the rest of the game in relative comfort and cue amazing celebrations when the full-time whistle went, with half the stadium going wild, while the other half - well, more like a quarter - filed out silently, thinking about might have been.

Seeing skipper Luke Waterfall raise the huge chunk of Checkatrade Trophy silverware aloft was fantastic and made the day complete. Let's hope we're back there, via Baker Street, on May 28!

Farmers were given 48 hours notice to abandon their homes and land before work began. By November 1943, 106 Squadron had arrived. Eventually some 2000 people were stationed there. The airfield was closed soon after the war ended.

An RAF memorial placed near to the runway records the names of airmen who died on missions, most of whom were in their early twenties. From the airfield we made our way

to the Car Dyke - a canal thought to be of Roman construction. From Car Dyke there are long views to Bardney and beyond as we followed the canal back to Martin.

A circular walk of approximately seven and a half miles from Willingham Woods at Market Rasen. Mostly level walking although some of the fields may be muddy.

We hope to see a lovely display of bluebells in Legsby Wood if our timing is right.

#### ■ MAY MEETING

▶ The next meeting of the Gardening Club will be held on Monday, 14 May, hosted by Colin and Jenny Rose.

#### GARDENING TASKS FOR MAY

Summer should be on its way - or was that it during the mini heatwave from 18-21 April! Hopefully not.

However, there could still be the possibility of late frosts during May, so be aware of this if you are planting out any summer bedding plants.

Overcrowded clumps of daffodils can be lifted and divided this month. Continue to feed the bulbs by watering with a high potash fertiliser, keep dead-heading and if possible, allow the foliage to die back naturally.

Similarly, Hostas (right) can be divided as they come into growth, but do continue to protect from snail and slug damage.

Cutting back clumps of spring-flowering perennials such as Pulmonaria can encourage a fresh flush of foliage. Spreading and trailing perennials such as Alyssum and Aubrieta can become tatty and patchy - trimming them back after flowering encourages fresh growth and new flowers.

Once the soil has warmed up a little, vegetable growing can get into full swing. We have started already by planting potatoes into pots, the broad beans which were started in the greenhouse have been planted out in succession, the rhubarb has already provided



the first delicious cake and home-grown green salads are on the menu - Yummy!

For this year, the festival is also focusing

# A PENSIONER REMINISCES:

incoln is a very special place for me for umpteen reasons. Sally and I were born in Leicestershire, but arrived here by default.

Our stay in Singapore was coming to end, the war in Borneo was nearing a conclusion, and time to return was getting closer. The RAF asked me where I would like to be posted to, and I remember saying St Mawgan in Cornwall, Lossiemouth in Scotland or Sealand in North Wales. Much to my disappointment they sent me to Waddington! Not that I knew anything about Lincolnshire, except that it was rather flat, and Skegness was its best asset. I've found out since that neither of those were true!

In the last two weeks we have twice found fame in different areas of life. Lincoln

The Imps' success in their first-ever visit to Wembley, beating favourites Shrewsbury 1-0 was an amazing achievement. None of us have ever seen so many Lincolnshire people gathered in one place at one time before – 27,000 in all (Editor: I think it was nearer 30,000).

The AI to London was awash with red and white, and of course Wembley Stadium was bursting with supporters. We stopped at Peterborough services on the return journey and it was almost impossible to get in there. No chance to even use the toilet.

I sat in the stadium next to a Skegness lady who also agreed her town wasn't the best place on earth! I doubt the guy who first carved the imp in the cathedral realised what fame he would have.

Our second event of great notoriety was the opening of the International Bomber Command Memorial at Bracebridge Heath. The tallest war memorial in the country. They came

from all over the world to be at the opening ceremony for a gathering of World War Two veterans. The weather was very poor, but vets from as far away as Australia and Canada still made the trip to honour colleagues who never came back.

The exhibition centre is well worth a visit. We might be reminded too that our lovely cathedral also held the record, when there were spires on the towers, of being the tallest building in the world in AD1311. Taller than the pyramids! The spires were finally removed in 1807.

The day after the opening, my third daughter came up for the day from Cambridgeshire to spend a day with us. She was born at Nocton Hall and wanted to see the changes that had been made in Lincoln. We pulled in to the bus station of which she heartily approved, and the first person I spotted was Harry Parkin, an old colleague who was at the opening ceremony the day before, and was interviewed on Look North, telling of his days as a Lancaster crew member.

He told me once they offered him the chance to fly in Wellingtons, but he said he preferred the sheepskin boots they were issued with!

The rest of the day was spent trudging up and down the High Street visiting every charity shop from just beyond the railway crossing, right up to the Cardinals Hat. There were enough benches on the way to satisfy my need to sit down, and in one shop I gave 50p of my hard-earned pension for a book written by an ex-RAF veteran named Henry Brown about his experiences. His first posting was to RAF Waddington! I read a number of pages of the book on my bench opposite the Cardinals Hat when Sarah finished her shopping, and we sauntered back down the

High Street towards the bus station. Turning into the Cornhill, I decided to take Sarah into the newly-restored Cosy Club restaurant. Apparently before my time in Lincoln, upstairs was a roller skating ring, and it has now been turned into a rather smart coffee shop and restaurant.

Going through the opening door it looks a bit like the sort of place that old men like me should avoid, but nothing could be further from the truth. We had coffee and cakes, and found out that if you went between 10 and 12 on a Wednesday morning, and showed your bus pass, you could get a free pot of tea! Long way to go for free tea, but if you're already in town, why avoid the chance of a free tea and a comfortable seat! At night it's beautifully lit up, by the electrical contracting company I started when I left the RAF in 1969.

My personal thanks went last month to those responsible for organising the benches sited at strategic places around the village. Unsung heroes to me. But what about that other group who planted all those hundreds of daffodil bulbs on our verges all around the village. To my mind they look absolutely stunning, and the village would be much the poorer without them. Where would we be without people like that? The same should be said about the group of litter pickers that give themselves annually to removing the garbage

that people scatter around our roads and hedgerows. Well done!

Perhaps by next month we will have our village shop back trading once more. I hope it is a success and the new owner makes a decent living from it. My own view is that wherever possible we should endeavour to make good us of it. We all know if we don't there is a good chance we'll lose it again, possibly never to return. We all run out of stuff from time to time, let's hope the shop can fulfill a need there.

There have been numerous attempts to make Village Hall activities a feature of the village, to generally improve our lives and make Sudbrooke a place where people want to live. #### ■ THE NUTS AND BOLTS

As I don't have a lot of PDA news this mont, I thought I would put together a few statistics to show you the full extent of the service offered by PDA volunteer drivers.

In the 12 months from April 2017 to March 2018, PDA drivers travelled 22,509 miles carrying 1,646 patients to their appointments both locally and to hospitals as far away as Derby, Nottingham and Sheffield.

We have, in recent years, had journeys to Moorfields eye hospital in London and both Papworth and Addenbrookes in Cambridgeshire although the majority of journeys are to Lincoln, Newark, Louth, Gainsborough and Grantham.

At this point I would like to make a further appeal to anyone who would be interested in volunteering to drive for a minimum of one day a month. We provide transport to any medical appointment and in addition I provide a monthly rota of drivers committing to one or more days taking patients to Welton Health Centre.

Volunteering isn't just about the 45 pence a mile payment received, but about the satisfaction of knowing you are providing an invaluable service to local residents, about the new people you meet and chat to and also about the grateful thanks received from those you transport.



Please consider paying our stall a visit. We will be open to sell from midday to 5pm (or until we have sold out).



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
