- b) New bus shelter, Wragby Road: A quotation had been received for an unglazed window in the price of £150.00. A vote was taken as to whether this expenditure should be made: For 2, Against 5. Resolved that the Parish Council take no action with regards to an opening/window in the bus shelter, but review in six months.

----- Chairman's Report -

■ It is my pleasure to give the Chairman's report to our activities over the last year.

The long drawn out saga of the footpath to Nettleham has reached a conclusion. The planning application for Poachers Lane has been agreed and as part of the 106 agreement, the village will gain the playing field next to the Village Hall and also land to the south of Church lane as far as Oak Cottage for a footpath.

It has also been agreed that the footpath will extend around the two corners at Church Lane as part of the planning application for the development of land for Sudbrooke House. Nettleham Parish Council have agreed to seek to extend the footpath as far as Nettleham as part of future development plans of their village.

The Sports day this year was a wash out due to the weather, but we are going to run an event this year and are hoping for better weather!

The Jubilee Garden has had 1200 plug plants planted to enrich the flora and this spring should see them grow to provide an array of colour and structure. We have also had made a new village notice board to complement the village map for the Jubilee Garden area and are in the process of having it erected.

The multi-surface playing court next to the Village Hall has had our attention. The court surface has been cleaned and the surface repainted for both tennis and a five-a-side court. The PC obtained funds to provide a new tennis net, net equipment, a container to keep it in, and to repair the wooden fencing. The surrounding foliage has been reduced to provide better light and deter anti-social behaviour.

The Village Hall and fencing for the tennis court has been the subject of minor, but continuous vandalism for a number of years; also there has been frequent reports of drug taking and of considerable amounts of litter being dumped. So in conjunction with the Village Hall committee, we have gained the funds to install CCTV around the hall and within. This will hopefully deter the vandals and displace the anti-social elements.

The bus shelter, opposite the Park gates, was in disrepair and has been replaced with a new shelter; again a grant was obtained to support this expensive project. We hope that the new shelter will last for many years, but would welcome further comments on visibility from within.

We persuaded the highways department to carry out an Archer Survey on Manor Drive/West Drive to obtain data on speed and usage from traffic in response to complaints from a resident. The survey showed that the majority of the traffic kept to the speed limits, but there are still a few who exceed the limit by a considerable margin. It is for the safety of all that we will seek to install traffic calming measures in the future.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

————— Chairman's Report continued ——————

The future of our village will have further development in part to comply with the nationwide requirement for more housing. We have been given an impression of the potential for development of the old Sudbrooke Park area, but as yet have no firm details as to the number and composition of the housing to be built. Once plans are submitted we will hold a public meeting to inform and acquire feedback from residents.

The Parish Council is ever mindful of the need to keep spending in check and I have to thank our excellent Parish Clerk for her knowledge of funds available and to our District and County Councillors or their positive support in acquiring grants for village projects. Without that support many of our projects would be simply a wish list and our village the poorer for it.

————— Clerk's Report ——

Another busy year for the Parish Council.

The PC continues to take advantage of grant aid available and I am always keeping alert to learn of new sources where there is spare money. We have been fortunate in gaining grants for the new notice board, bus shelter, cctv, wildflowers.

Legislation for Parish Councils continues to change and increase which has prompted me to undertake the training for the Certificate in Local Council Administration.

Sudbrooke was fortunate in continuing through the first round of the BKVC.

Peter Malone, our Playground Inspector, continues to work hard to keep our play equipment in safe order and I thank Peter for being so willing to do the small jobs that are often difficult to be able to get a tradesman to carry out.

Bridget Solly, our Treasurer, is also kept busy keeping the Parish finances in order, not always an easy task.

The Parish Council has commented on 15 planning applications during the last year.

Treasurer's Report

Firstly I would like to thank the Clerk for all her efforts to secure almost £6,000 in grants this financial year - a fantastic amount of money that has allowed the Council to purchase a new bus shelter, re-surface the multi-purpose sports area and purchase a new notice board.

Monies this year have been spent as follows:

£5,960 - grass cutting with the Count Council paying a contribution of £2,263.

£2,450 - **Sudbrooke News** with advertising revenue generated of £1,224.

A full copy of the accounts will be available to members of the public in due course as per instructions from the Auditors.

This year monies have also been spent on insurance, general administration and conservation.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

District Councillor's Report

■ During the last year I have remained Chairman of West Lindsey Planning Committee and also sit on the Central Lincolnshire Planning Committee responsible for preparing the Local Plan for central Lincolnshire covering West Lindsey, North Kesteven and the City of Lincoln for the next 20 years.

At present, the Lincoln fringe area settlements such as Welton, Cherry Willingham, Nettleham and Saxilby are having to take more than their fair share of new development, but once the Local Plan has been adopted it will define precise areas for development in each settlement.

Unlike other Local Authorities in the county, your green wheelie bins are to remain free. West Lindsey has one of the highest recycling rates in the country with 53.2% of all waste collections in 2013/14 going for recycling.

Under the District Councillor Initiative Fund I have during the last year sanctioned grants to Sudbrooke & Scothern Parish Councils and Village Hall Committees and also to Scothern and Sudbrooke Tennis Clubs for capital projects.

Finally, your Council Tax for the next civic year has been frozen for the third consecutive year.

Local Organisations Report =

■ Gardening Club - Sent by the Chair, Mike Halliday, and read out to the meeting The slub has a stable membership and seems to have settled into a regular programme of active.

The club has a stable membership and seems to have settled into a regular programme of activities. We hold nine meetings per year of which:

- The March and October meetings are held at the Village Hall where we engage a speaker. Non-members are invited to attend these meetings.
- The April and September meetings are the club Spring and Autumn shows held at the Village Hall. All residents including children are invited to exhibit at the shows.
- In July we visit a stately home or famous garden and generally enjoy a full day out. This year we are visiting Geoff Hamilton's gardens at Barnsdale.
- The May, June, August and December meetings are hosted by members at their homes.

■ Walking Group - Sent by Mike Halliday and read out to the meeting

The group has existed for about eight years and continues to attract new walkers from the village plus a few from further afield.

We have a total membership of around 25 walkers, but usually find a group size of 12 to 15 walkers is the 'norm.'

We use **Sudbrooke News** and email to communicate with members and meet on the first Saturday of every month at the village hall at 9.30am. We aim to walk between six and nine miles and try to return to Sudbrooke by 1.30pm, but it can be later if we are doing a coastal walk or similar long distance from Sudbrooke. Members are given good notice of a likely late return.

In recent years our December walk has ended with a group Christmas meal, thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. The group is run on informal lines with no membership subscriptions and members volunteer to lead walks


ST GEORGE'S DAY PARADE =

Dear Editor,

Letters in recent editions of **Sudbrooke News** re. toads, woodpeckers etc... has prompted me to highlight how lucky we currently are in terms of local wildlife.

Few villages contain the many different habitats we enjoy. These include woodland, parkland, arable fields and grassland, gardens, ponds and a clear running stream.

The woods in the park are at the core, comprising low scrub, a medium height shrub layer and taller trees also. Each support their own ecology of life – insects, beetles, birds, mammals etc.

Most importantly, they complement each other to support a much larger range of species as a whole than those of the individual parts. The stream and hedges provide natural corridors for wildlife to travel and extend their range. Our kingfishers are an obvious example to use such a corridor.

The "Footpaths Walks around Sudbrooke" booklet, produced by the Parish Council in 1998, lists 78 different birds, 13 mammals and 11 butterflies, all seen in the village.

The vast majority of birds can be seen fairly regularly, but the list also includes such rarities as hawfinch, waxwing, water rail and passing osprey.

Recent additions include lesser spotted woodpecker, which nested in a neighbour's garden, little egret and buzzards which are now often to be seen soaring over the woods.

To the mammals list we can now add Muntjac deer and water shrew. If you are lucky, this large shrew - black above and pale below - can sometimes be seen hunting underwater next to bridges. As the air is trapped in their fur they appear silver underwater.

Now is a great time to enjoy the wildlife by a walk through the park. Warblers from Africa including chiffchaff, blackcap and willow warbler can all be heard singing and with patience are visible, often towards the tops of trees.

Song thrushes, blackbirds, goldfinches, greenfinches, wrens, jays and woodpeckers are also amongst the many birds calling to claim their territory.

Some already have nests and mallard and rooks already have young.

Brimstone yellow, peacock, comma and small tortoiseshell butterflies are now on the wing. Orange tips, paintedlady and red admirals are among those to follow.

Although frogs and toads have declined over the years, a small amount of spawn has been laid in the balancing pond in the woods and hopefully more in garden ponds. Newts have also been busy with the annual breeding cycle before leaving the ponds around May / June.

Sudbrooke is a fantastic place to live and a great place for wildlife also.

It's all there to be enjoyed by ourselves now and, given the chance, by future generations too.

HEADING OFF INTO PASTURE —

■ There seemed to be a time when it was easy to answer the above question.

Stereotypically, you received a gold watch and then went home and 'into pasture' courtesy of your favourite armchair. This description seems justified when seeking enlightenment in Collins Dictionary and Thesaurus, where retirement is defined as: to give up work, withdrawal, loneliness, obscurity, retreat, seclusion, solitude, privacy. Taken at surface value, this paints a very gloomy picture of retirement, so let's see if we can cheer ourselves up!

Upon retiring there are two main considerations, both of which need addressing if a meaningful retirement is to be created.

Role loss

■ The first consideration is that of loss of the work role, especially if the retiree enjoyed their work in terms of job satisfaction (status, achievement, financial reward, respect of work colleagues).

This would have the added benefit of not only creating space in the domestic relationship, but also providing a focus of interest in any conversations between partners.

Also, by only working part-time (paid or unpaid), this still provides some space for indulging in some leisure activities to develop you as a person. Health-permitting, we have a choice - vegetate, consolidate or propagate!

Some suggested areas for personal development:

- Physical development (sports, walking etc)
- Study development(learn a language, take a Degree course)
- Social development (Local history groups, gardening clubs)
- Skills development (computers, photography, writing)
- Compassion development (Volunteeringhome or abroad)

(But not if this was your main career - then this new period of your life is for YOU. You are not being selfish, this is your time that you have earned in past health and welfare employment)

The key to your choices is that all spare time activities in retirement should be fulfilling not time-filling (ie) meaningful, and purposeful, proactive not reactive.
